On Saturday evening of this week the greatest and final basketball contest of the year will take place at the Tillamook high school. This game is to be a contest for the county between the high schools of the county against the independent hoop stars, two teams of all star players selected by the Herald sports editor, battling each other.

The high school stars are selected from the Cloverdale and Tillamook teams—teams that were undoubtedly the best ever turned out by Tillamook county high schools. The independents are selected from five of the ten independent teams of the county—two from Wheeler, one from Blaine, one from Cloverdale, four from the Tillamook K. P. team and one from the local Odd Fellows.

The selection of these teams was at the suggestion of Coach French of the Tillamook high school. French has a double purpose in view in sending these two teams against each other; one to raise funds with which to stage a county wide field day for grade, high school and independent athletes and second to wind up the county hoop season in one big grand game.

Basketball enjoyed its most prosperous year in Tillamook county this season. More teams were organized, more games played, more state recognition gained and surely more players developed. From the point of attendance and consequently finance, the season has been a howling success. Crowds that taxed the capacity of the local gym were in attendance all over the county. In one game here over 900 witnessed the contest.

The selection of these two teams was indeed a difficult task. With a wealth of former high school players and the new stars developed every paying record had to be taken on due notice of before a selection was made.

In selecting Erskine of the Tillamook K. P. team for forward we believe we have selected the most promising forward developed this year. He is sifty, uses his head guards nicely and shoots fairly accurately. To Coach French who develops his latent talents we take our hats, for we believe with another season "Ersky" will be the best forward in the county, bar none. As running mate we must choose between Patenei of Wheeler and August of Blaine. Hollett has the better record of the two due to the fact that he has played in more games, but Patenei is the more aggressive. Both are A-1 men, however, and we will eagerly await their playing Saturday night that final selection may be made.

It is a nip and tuck race between Joe Plasker of the Tillamook K. P. team and Maginnis of the Cloverdale Bearcats for the center job. Joe may out-jump his man—usually does—but as a guard Maginnis is a bearcat. Joe is a wonderful shot from the floor—so is Maginnis. Joe main value to a team however, is his stamina and fighting qualities. He plays every instant, no matter what the score, and in at least two contests this year pulled his team out in the lead by taking the initiative and going in after the ball and working it down. He not only can play center, but is a valuable guard and a dandy forward. He mayhap appear at forward part of the time Saturday night.

For the position of guard August Boquist and Fank of the K. P. teams, Telford of the Wheeler team and Conover of the Odd Fellows are about even up. Boquist is perhaps the more consistent player of the four. Fank has been handicapped all season with illness. Conover is a valuable man and plays the game for all there is in it and if going good as he was early in the season would make any team. Telford, of Wheeler, is a new man around here. To the writer he looked ex-

ceedingly good in his one appearance here and his season record looks up our selection as an all-star player. He shoots very accurately from long range and runs the floor nicely.

On the high school all-star squad we have selected White of Tillamook for forward. His work entitles him to this position undisturbedly. Johnson of Cloverdale and Mathews of Tillamook must fight it out for the other berth. Mathews in the last few games has developed wonderfully, going in and taking a shot and running the floor nicely. Johnson has the advantage in weight and in shooting.

For center there is only one man—Gabriel. He runs the team better than any other man from this section and is a valuable floor man good on passes, on shooting and on defense.

At guard Owens gets first mention. He has been holding down the center berth for Cloverdale but is ability. He is the best defense man in the county and a good shot. He would go big.

The other guard must be filled by Tone, Stark and Johnson of Cloverdale. Stark is a better long-range shot that is either Johnson or Tone according to records, and guards nicely. Tone is a consistent player, a flashy checker and a level, cool headed basketeer. Johnson has been ill the later part of the season, but is said to be a very brilliant player.

Every man named on these teams will be given an opportunity to show his wares Saturday night. French will handle the high schoolers and Foster and Simonson the independents. The independents worked out last night on the local floor. The high schoolers work out tonight. Morrison will referee the game, which in itself is assurance that it is to be a fast, snappy affair.

Admission is 35c, the proceeds, as has been stated to go toward defraying the expenses of a county-wide track meet and field day in which every grammar school, every high school and every amateur independent athlete will get a chance to compete in his own class for county honors. This promises to be one of the biggest events ever staged in the county and one of the premier sporting events of the entire state.

K. P. TEAM LOSES TO TILLAMOOK

The Tillamook and K. P. basketball quintets put on a forty-minute sketch at the high school gym Tuesday night, the Tillamook team being adjudged the head-liner by a 28 to 13 score.

The crowd (and it was a large one and a non-partisan one) was kept in an uproar by the tumbling and rolling acts of the basketball actors. Whether they were celebrating the first day of Spring or really basketball we'll never know for they were rolling around on the floor the larger portion of the time.

Tillamook started things with a rush and shot two baskets before the K. P. lads woe up. When the timers blew the whistle for the end of the first half the score stood six-eight Tillamook. It was found that the timer's action was a little premature—three minutes, in fact—so the teams were sent to finish the half. When it ended this time the Tillamook team was leading by a 14 to 8 score.

The lodgemen started the second half with a bang but their supporters' joy was short-lived for Tillamook's defense tightened and held while Gabriel rolled up point after point. When he tired Mathews and White took a hand making six points between them.

For the K. P. team Heisel was the big noise. He out-played his running-mate, Erskine, despite the fact that the latter has been picked as an all-star. Plasker failed to get a point, the first time that has happened this season. Foster, too, could not get going. August Boquist played a good defensive game. Driscoll got in the line-up for the Tillamook team in the first half and performed nicely. He puts pep into things. Gabriel was the high man of the evening, getting 20 points.
