BETTER SHIPPING FACILITIES INTERESTS CHAMBER

The Tillamook Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors, which was recently elected, is composed of State Senator C. J. Edwards, W. J. Riechers, F. A. Beltz, Fred C. Baker, A. G. Beals, B. B. Miller and Burr Beals, Jr., was called together for the purpose of electing a president and secretary-treasurer and appointing committees, when all the members were present. The officers and chairmen of committees are:

The question of shipping facilities for Tillamook City and this part of the county is considered the most important question for the board and chamber to discuss, and from all indications an attempt will be made to solve this problem to the interest of all concerned. F. A. Beltz, who is chairman of the traffic, transportation and waterways committee was recently in San Francisco and came in touch with some of the shippers, and in conversation with them found that a great many things that Tillamook need, such as hay and feed and other merchandise, originated in California and had to be shipped to Portland, which caused the freight rates to be nearly twice what they should be, and by having shipping facilities here a great saving would be obtained. When the Sue H. Elmore plied between Portland and Tillamook freight rates were one half what they are now. The board of directors are of the opinion that the future growth and industrial development of this city and this part of the county depends largely upon obtaining shipping facilities. Failing in this city will be greatly handicapped and other places with shipping advantages will forge ahead. Whether the Chamber of Commerce will be able to devise a plan to solve this problem depends upon the support it obtains from the people in this vicinity. The matter was considered of such importance that the president was instructed to call another meeting of the board as soon as some date is obtained, and at the next monthly meeting of the Chamber, which will be the first Thursday in April, this will be one of the topics for discussion.

TAXATION AND LUMBERING

Producing on small margins the lumbering and logging industry cannot stand present taxation bills and must get relief in lower rates. The Astorian announces that the big deal of the Long-Bell Lumber Co. of Kansas City for the Hammond properties cannot be completed.

The Clatsop county paper speaks of the Long-Bell corporation erecting a "monster plant within a short distance of this city."

The reports have it that the Kansas City concern has bought large timber interests in Oregon will build its first mill in Washington. The Long and Short of it is that taxes in Pacific county, across the river are much lower than in Oregon, and Oregon loses the mill.

Many sawmills and logging properties are on the delinquent tax rolls, and many have had to cut lumber from two to four months to pay taxes.

Industries will not be established in a state that runs its taxation system so high that the burdens become oppressive to capital and labor. Washington is making a determined fight to cut the overhead of state expenses and city and county expenses about 25 per cent in 1922 and more next year.

Oregon and other western states must follow suit or they will be found undesirable places for home seekers and investors coming to the west.
