"Johnny" Aschim, Sheriff, Stands Acc High Among Odd Fellows

One of the most promising young Odd Fellows of Oregon is Grand Warden John Aschim, sheriff of Tillamook county. He was born in Farley, S. D., April 21, 1886, and came to Oregon in 1887. When 15 years of age he went to work on a farm near Tillamook, after having lived in Scappoose valley near Forest Grove for 10 years before. He studied hard and worked his own way through the Tillamook high school. "Johnny" Aschim was junior of the Tillamook city school, night operator in the Pacific Telephone and during vacation worked for Wells Fargo company. In 1908, Sheriff Crenshaw made him a deputy, and in 1911 he was district attorney for Tillamook county. In 1914-15 he was city recorder of Tillamook city, and in the fall of 1920 made a successful campaign for sheriff of the Tillamook county.

Johnny Aschim joined the I. O. O. F. in 1907 and three years later was made noble grand of Tillamook lodge No. 91. He is an active member of the I. O. O. F. encampment and has served as district deputy grand master and as district deputy grand patriarch grand herald in 1919. Johnny Aschim has been degree captain for some years in the lodge, the encampment and the Rebekahs. His lodge has

grown from about 125 in 1907 to over 300. The Tillamook degree team is one of the best in the state and is famed for its snap and precision. It has put on the work before the grand lodge with great distinction. Grand Warden Aschim is the "daddy" of Mount Hebo lodge No. 281 of Beaver and of Wheeler lodge No. 240 of Wheeler, Tillamook county. As a lad struggling to obtain an education he was known to everybody in Tillamook as Johnny Aschim, and even if he attains the distinction of grand master will still be Johnny Aschim to all Tillamook people. Recently the degree team, headed by him visited Star lodge of Portland. No better work in the craft of Odd Fellowship had ever been seen.

The club women of the state are using their influence in every way to encourage foreigners in the state to learn to read and speak the American language. Several of the foreign men attend night school but their wives at home remain almost ignorant of our customs, language, and ideals.

The club women are going into these homes and helping the foreign women to learn American ways.

The Federation has in its midst all types of women. It isn't a "class" affair. Rich and poor, city and country, educated and untrained broad and narrow, conservative and radical all meet and realize that the things that bind them together are far deeper than the things that separate them.

Public welfare work is one of the greatest things that the Club women are doing. Crippled children are cured; others greatly benefited by the assistance of the women's club each year. The tremendous need of a hospital for these children becomes more evident every time a case goes up to the specialists for treatment. The club women of the state are caring for these children as rapidly as possible and working with all the force that is in them for the betterment of hospital facilities.

Each year at Christmas the club women all over the state sell Christmas seals. The proceeds goes to help children suffering from tuberculosis, and they also do all they can to prevent the spread of this disease. Surely no person with a conscience would refuse to buy these seals which might mean health and happiness to some child.
