EARL E. FISHER OF BEAVERTON IS OUT AGAINST HAWLEY

Earl E. Fisher of Beaverton has hurled his challenge into the congressional ring of the First district as an anti-Jap, pro-bonus, pro-farmer, anti-purse seine opponent to congressman Willis C. Hawley for the Republican nomination.

Mr. Fisher, in the statement announcing his candidacy, says that he has served through two sessions of legislature as a representative from Washington county without missing a roll call. He contends that during this time he supported all legislation in favor of the farmer, voted for the soldier's bonus act and opposed the ownership of land in Oregon by the Japs.

"For years," Fisher says in his opening statement, "we have had a gentlemen's agreement with Japan. Note how the Japs are flocking to the Pacific Coast. God help us. Adopt an American agreement, get rid of the Japs, make the white man happy in his own home. The rising sun may set in the west, but it shall never set on the West with my consent."

As a slogan to be inscribed upon the ballot with his name Fisher asks the secretary of state to use the phrase "Fighting for the farmer and soldier bonus. The Japs must go."

The platform framed by the Washington county candidate is as follows: "I will serve the public interests by voting with Congressman Sinnott for 50 per cent surtax on incomes, against the millionaire shifting his taxes on to the farmer and business man of small income."

"I will fight with the farm bloc and Oregon State Grange for the farmer. A bonus and square deal for the soldiers."

"Make Oregon harbor the best in the West."

"Against purse seine fishing. Give the poor fisherman a chance."

"Merchant marine with American flag in every port of the world."

"Absolute exclusion of all Japs. Give us an American agreement."
