It is understood that Wheeler and Nehalem are desirous of entering the league and certain it is that Beaver is for it. Tillamook will probably get into it and there is even talk of a team from the Grande Ronde seeking entry.

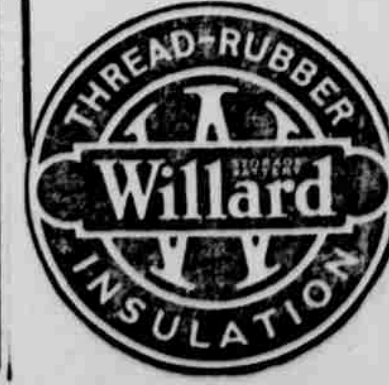
