(Continued from page one.) To be printed on ballot after my name:

"Reduce taxes, encourage industry, efficiency in all departments of government."

Winslow's "declaration of intent" and the foundation for his platform are as follows:

If I am nominated for the office of representative to the Legislature from Tillamook County, Oregon, at the primary nominating election to be held in the County of Tillamook the 15th day of May, 1922, I will accept the nomination and will not withdraw, and, if I am elected I will qualify as such officer.

If I am not nominated, I will not accept the nomination or endorsement of any party other than the one in which I am registered.

If I am nominated and elected, I will, during my term of office, work for legislation that will reduce taxes, especially on real estate, and for a re-formation in public expenditures.

Will work to compel the Highway Commission to complete original plan for improvement of State Highway, including the paving of twenty miles south of Tillamook City.

Taxes must be reduced and in order to do this I will favor cutting all appropriations and abolishing all useless commissions and will require the same value for a dollar which we received in pre-war days.

Insert the following after my name on the ballot:

"Reduction of taxes, especially on land; less appropriations, less commissions, more efficiency."

good judge of distance but was slow in delving, whereas the Brighton man was quick as greased lightning, both offensively and defensively.

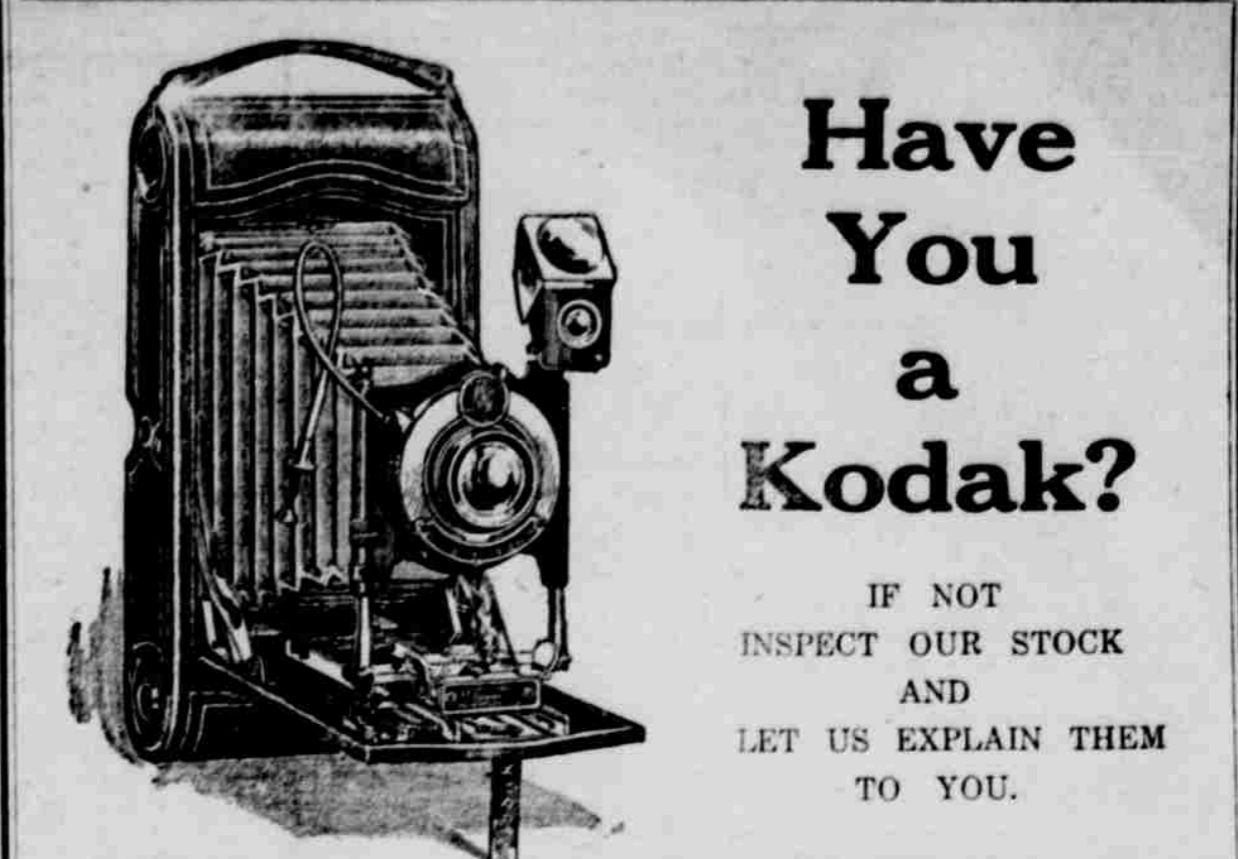
