## CARROL TO PILOT TILLAMOOK TEAM; A. H. FRENCH SIGNED AS COACH

Tillamook is to be represented in the newly organized Tillamook county Baseball League by one of the happiest, best balanced semi-pro ball organizations that ever wore spikes, in the opinion of those of us who watched the two score or more of ball tossers go through their first paces on the fair ground ball lot last Sunday.

In the matter of management the Tillamook club is one of the most fortunate ones, for John Carroll, county road master, a great lover of team athletics and prominent in the county over, has consented to take the reins and to put the team on a safe official basis to go the season rough.

While Carroll will handle the business end of the club he will rely largely on the judgment of Coach A. H. French when it comes to selecting the men who are to battle for the gonfalon. In this matter Tillamook is again extremely fortunate for certain it is there is no better versed athletic coach in this part of the state (and few in the state) than French. He has been given full charge of the men on the field and this week put them through two stiff workouts.

French is very optimistic as to the outcome of the season. "Seldom have I ever seen a more likely looking bunch of tossers than those who are turning out for places on our team," said French to a Herald man yesterday. "We have two or three good men for every position and we know where we can lay our hands on two or three more, if needed and so you tell the fans for me that Tillamook is going to give the other highly touted clubs in this circuit something to scratch their noggins over before the season is very far advanced."

The club is being picked on merit—the best man wins. Fifteen men will be carried to start the season and while this number may be pruned down to 13 or 12 later on it is more than probable that the majority of these players will be Tillamook lad- for the coach is of the impression that he has some of the best material in the state to work on and is going to do his utmost to vindicate this opinion.

The diamond at the fair ground will be improved and put in shape for opening day, May 14, a new score board will be erected, new bases provided and foul lines established. New uniforms of the best obtainable are to be purchased and everything possible done when Tillamook formally takes its place in the baseball world for her first regular league season of baseball.

The support of every individual, club and organization in the city will be asked. The team is to be conducted as a civic enterprise and will be a Tillamook team in every sense of the word. The financial end of the club will be carefully conducted, that is a foregone conclusion and it is the aim of the management to permit the books to be open for inspection at all times. A financial report will be published from time to time.

Opening day is to be made a gala event in Tillamook with a big street parade, attendant ceremonies at the ball park and if possible Mayor Moulton and County Judge Mason will be prevailed upon to throw and catch the first ball.

All together now—Let's Go. Get behind this team and give it the best that is in you for that's what the team has promised to do in turn for you.

## BIG COUNTY TRACK MEET TO BE HELD SATURDAY, MAY 13

Tillamook High School will hold its annual County school track and field meet at the Tillamook County Fair Grounds, on Saturday, May 13th.

The plan is to hold four separate meets; one for the High Schools belonging to the State Association, one for the High Schools not belonging to the Association one for the two grade schools, and one for the rural schools. Trophies will be awarded to the winning team of each meet, the high point man of each meet, and also to the man placing first, second and third in the various events.

The events for the high schools will be as follows: 440 yard dash, 200 yard dash, 100 yard dash, 50 yard dash, one mile run, 880 yard run, one-half mile relay, 220 low hurdles, 120 high hurdles, pole vault, discus throw, standing broad jump, running broad jump, running high jump.

The events for the rural and town schools will be as follows: standing broad jump, running high jump, hop step and jump, 60 yard dash, shot put, base ball throw for distance and chin-up.

Each team will be required to satisfy its own expenses. The gate receipts will be used to pay the expense incurred in holding this meet, and the balance, if any, will be used toward reimbursing the teams participating.

All entries must be in no later than May 6th. All contestants will please be at the Tillamook High School Gymnasium Building at 10:30 A. M., on May 13th, to be numbered and classified.

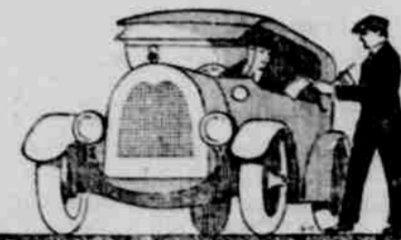
