## EDITORIAL COMMENT

### HALL AND NORBLAD

The Republicans of the Coast Counties are evidently centering their strength on A. W. Norblad for Congress and Charles Hall for Governor. This is well.

As between Norblad and Hawley, the present incumbent, there can be no question. Hawley has had his great opportunity and has not lived up to expectations. Norblad is aggressively progressive, has a thorough knowledge of what his constituents want and are entitled to at the hands of the Washington government and is capable of making a home, at least at Washington. Hawley has served for sixteen long years and is at this time further away from our needs, our needs and our demands than when he took the long, long trip to the District of Columbia.

As between Hall and the other five Republican aspirants for the nomination of Governor one thus little choice. Hall, however has been closely affiliated with the development and legislative needs of these counties and has faithfully promised not to forsake his "homeland" if nominated and elected to succeed Ben Orcutt.

### THE CANNING INDUSTRY

This is the largest industry in the state when it comes to employment of purely family labor.

It is the industry that links the town and the country together in the employment of men, women and children, in making the crops of raw material for the canneries, gathering straw and vegetables gives outdoor employment.

Both the canneries and the growing of the pack for the canneries employ labor from city and country on a large scale.

The children work with the parents and all the work is healthful and involves no demoralizing features for young people.

There is no industry that circulates so much money directly to the support of families and at times of the year when other employment is hard to get.

Canneries, jelly factories and fruit preserving works may be considered as the salvation of the small land owner and the small home owner dependent on employment for a living.

### 1922 TAXES TOTAL \$40,500,000

While 11 counties reduced taxes slightly for 1922, \$1,900,000, in 21 counties increases are shown. In Multnomah county taxes for 1922 are \$1,900,000 below 1921.

Deschutes county increased 23 per cent, Lincoln county 22 per cent, Curry, Douglas, Grant and Tillamook 15 per cent, Benton, Umatilla and Union 11 per cent, and the rest about 8 per cent. Levies for interest on bonds aggregates \$4,000,000.

Net reduction on all taxes paid in the state for 1922 is only \$700,000 below 1921. These figures are published by the Oregon Voter.
