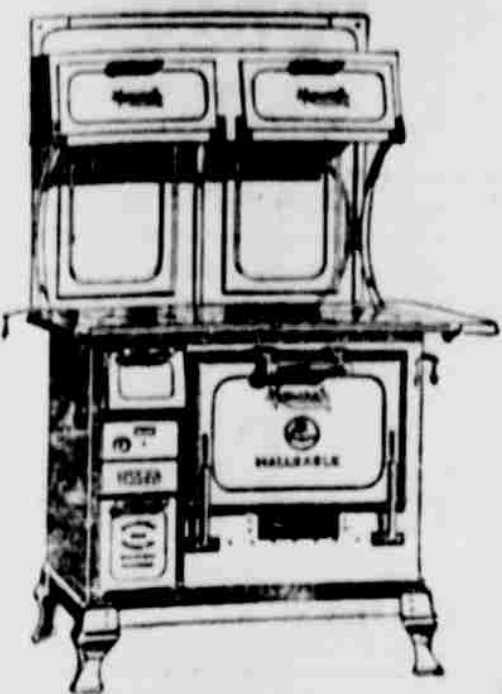

LEAGUE MEETS, LAYS PLANS FOR SEASON

Representatives of the different ball clubs that go to make up the Tillamook County Baseball League met at the city hall last Saturday evening to further perfect the organization.

The Garibaldi Club was admitted to membership and the Kothler club dropped upon information received that the idea of maintaining a club at Camp Four or Mohler had been abandoned in the interests of the three clubs in the circuit who are from the Northern part of the county. The Fairview club did not enter, lack of time for organization being given as the reason.

With Garibaldi admitted the league now consists of six teams: Tillamook, Beaver, Garibaldi, Brighton, Wheeler and Nehalem.

The three teams in the other end of the county will use the diamond at Mohler and the one at Nehalem, Garibaldi is building a diamond, Beaver is also providing a new field and Tillamook will use the Fair Grounds. Other teams will probably stage games on the Fair Grounds especially when the three from above have games at home, which either means a double header or a transfer here.

Closing date for the signature of new players was set for Saturday, May 13, the date being set ahead at the request of several managers. The Wilson ball, sold by Halton's, was adopted as the official ball and will be used in all league games.

John Carroll, A. F. French and Doc Simonsen represented Tillamook, Carroll being the official spokesman and manager.

The final meeting before the season opens will be held at Wheeler Saturday evening.

Elaborate preparations are being made by Manager John Carroll for the opening of the baseball season here on Sunday, May 14 (a week from this coming Sunday).

A big downtown street parade participated by all the city and county officials, the band, civic and fraternal organizations and members of both teams will precede the game.
