The baseball season will officially open in Tillamook Sunday when the Tillamook County Baseball League meet on the Fair Grounds at 1:30 P. M. in what is planned as one of the most auspicious openings ever held here.

Mayor Sam Moulton will pitch the first ball with County Judge Mason acting as catcher. This official act on the part of the city and county representatives will officially open the league season, but previous to this an impressive street parade will be held on the town square.

In the line of march will be the band, the city and county officials, the members of both teams, league officials and any fraternal organization or private citizen who wants to join the happy throng.

Bad weather has hampered practice the week but both clubs are on their toes and ready to go. The ground has been put in fairly good shape, a new score board ordered, as well as new bases.

League officials have ordered that the game be played if weather is at all permissible. This means that the weather man will have to be very rainy and bad before the game will be called. Local weather prognosticators have, however, given it as their opinion that good weather should prevail Sunday, which is cheery news to say the least.

Natty new uniforms were ordered this week to arrive here in time for Sunday's game. The uniforms are of good, heavy durable material, white with a fine black stripe and black and white stockings and caps.

One of the biggest opening day crowds ever attending a ball game is expected. The team is made up of local players, though at least a few of them are new to local fans. They are a clean, manly bunch of athletes, good account of themselves on any diamond. They are under the management of John Carroll county road supervisor, and A. W. French coach.

COUNTY TO DO WORK—COMMISSIONERS ASK AID FOR HEBO ROAD

The State Highway Commission Tuesday contracted with the Tillamook County Court to lay 4.7 miles of pavement on that portion of the Coast Highway between Mohler and the Clatsop county line at a price of \$55,468.90.

This action was taken at a meeting held in Portland at which time much road construction was ordered through out the state.

Commissioners Farmer and Alley of Tillamook asked state co-operation for grading and graveling south of Hebo and expressed preference for a tri-party project with the county, state and forest department. No action was taken on this.

NEW BATTERY STATION IS BEING ERECTED

Construction was begun this week on the new home to be occupied by the Sunset Auto Electric Service, local sales and service station for the Exide battery.

The building is being erected on Second Ave. East, directly opposite from the Sunset Garage, the parent company. It will be of bungalow type, 30x22 feet in dimension and with a 10 foot roof. Entrance will be provided from side street, an appropriate canopy being incorporated that will permit of the "drive-in" plan.

The building when completed will be one of the most creditable in the town and the owners and its equipment will be the best obtainable. Messrs. Dixon and Jones have gone to Portland this week to purchase the machinery and fixtures.

It is hoped to have the building ready for occupancy by the last of this month.

HALL, TOO, RUNNING STRONG

POLITICAL POT FAIRLY SIMMERING AS PRIMARIES APPROACH.

With the primary nominating election just a week off the prevailing opinion just now is course political.

The three-cornered race for Representative from this county ranks first in importance in the voter's eyes with the Congressional fight and the Governorship race next in the order named.

In the race for the legislature Reed has gained an expected strength in the last week. Being a resident of the North end of the county it was to be expected that he ran strong there but reports coming in earlier in the campaign listed the voters there as rather lukewarm toward him. In the last week however the north end has become strictly partisan to him and the plan is to swing the entire strength of that end of the county to the hotel man. Reed is a good campaigner and is now working in Tillamook proper and the Southern end of the county where Rollie Watson seems to have the edge over the other two candidates.

Watson has been combing the county for votes and his supporters claim daily added strength. George Winslow is working like a Trojan to land the nomination. Last week he spent two days in the North and this week has devoted much time to campaigning in the other sections.

Straw votes taken throughout the county this week show no particular chance for any one candidate. In Tillamook Winslow has been leading Watson with Reed running third. In the South Watson has been leading in field. From this it can be seen that at this time the three are running partially neck and neck. What the next week will bring forth to one can tell.

Norblad has Hawley badly beaten in this county from all reports. Every where one hears the same report: just Hawley; he has been there long enough. Norblad stands a very good chance to win the nomination. This year's paper in this district are actively supporting him and he is gaining strength each and every day.

Hall seems to have a slight lead over White and Olcott in the governorship race with Patterson running fourth in this locality. Hall is being backed by local republicans and the Roosevelt Highway boosters.

Ralph Williams for National Committeeman is apparently running away from his opposition here and Thos. J. Ryan seems to have a good lead over Hoff for state treasurer.

The only county office to be filled, aside from the precinct committeeman and the Port Commission, is that of County Commissioners. Both the Republicans and the Democrats have united on one man, who will of course be nominated. They both came from the south end of the county.

E. L. Westover of Portland was registered at the Tillamook Tuesday.
