

EDITORIAL NOTES.

The principal objection offered by the opponents of the graduated income tax is that it would tend to corrupt the morals of the millionaires; they would resort to lying in giving in their incomes. Just think of it. Corrupting the morals of an innocent millionaire! Could the people ever forgive themselves should they pass a law that would have this effect?

At a meeting of the National Committee of the People's party, held at St. Louis Feb. 22, it was resolved that as the Wilson bill "discriminates against the producers of raw material in the South and West and protects the monopolists of the East," and that it "fails to provide sufficient revenue to defray the legitimate expenses of the government, thereby creating a deficiency which the administration will take advantage of to issue interest bearing bonds," the People's party Senators and Representatives should vote against the bill unless it provides for said deficiency by an income tax. Good advice. Let us favor the income tax, even if it has to ride in on the Wilson bill.

From an address issued by the above committee we quote:

"They [the old parties] propose to down the outcries 'of a plundered people with the uproar of a sham battle over the tariff, so that capitalists, corporations, national banks, rings, trusts, watered stock, the demonetization of silver, and the oppressions of the usurers may all be lost sight of. They propose to sacrifice our homes, wives, and children on the altar of Mammon; to destroy the multitude in order to secure corruption funds from the millionaires.'"

The House of Commons of England has voted to abolish the House of Lords.

The following resolutions, introduced by W. J. Dean, were adopted by the Talent People's party club at its last meeting;

Whereas, Sam'l Danielson and T. E. Hills were thrust aside and J. W. Marksbury and J. A. Jeffrey (the latter having received but 16 preferential votes) were nominated instead; and

Whereas, ignoring the candidates above mentioned was an error—intentional or otherwise—therefore be it

RESOLVED, that it is the sense of this club that said Sam'l Danielson and T. E. Hills are, and of right ought to be, the nominees of the People's party of Jackson county for representatives to the next legislature, and that J. W. Miller is the rightful nominee for recorder. And

Whereas, S. H. Dunlap, having received 111 preferential votes, or a plurality of 23 over S. Patterson, the next highest, and whereas, at the convention the said Dunlap received but 12 delegate votes and Patterson 28; therefore be it

RESOLVED, that this club can find no compensating circumstances to justify so flagrant a deviation from the choice of the People's party of Jackson county, as expressed in the preferential vote on March 10th, and that it does not indorse the action of the convention in this case.
