### Power and Light Station On Rock Creek

From The "Daily Record Abstract" Salem, Ore.—Special. G. J. Burdick, Portland, has applied to the state engineer for 45.7 second feet of water from Rock Creek tributary to the Nehalem river, to generate light and power. R. W. Lincoln, Ry. Ex. Bld. Portland, is the engineer in charge of constructing a hydro turbine plant to develop 400 horse power under a 77 foot head. A timber crib and rock filled dam 22 feet high and 100 feet long to be constructed with waste way and timber headgates.
