BOOSTS FOR VERNONIA ST. HELENS MIST

Jeremy Kram, writing for St. Helens Mist, last week devoted two columns to the magnificent possibilities of Vernonia, to our busy city, our crowds, and our big celebration. He described with much eloquence the first train into Vernonia, and so pretty does it sound that we reprint a stick full from the end of his long article.

"The day closed in a blaze of glory. The visitors, tired but well content with Vernonia's charming hospitality, departed by rail and auto. The sun went down and twilight fell upon the valley. From a hill apart I saw the lights of the town appear out of the darkness one by one. The lights of the carnival, red and green and blue, twinkled merrily as if to the tune of the merry-go-round, and rockets spurted brilliant streamers into the skies. Standing on the same hill a year from now we may not see rockets or the multi-colored glow of a carnival, but instead, we shall doubtless behold the arclights of a fair-sized city."

Raised Here

A producer "bawled us out" this week about conditions that from his view—point certainly has merit. The Nehalem Valley around Vernonia is an agriculture country. We advertise the fact; we are proud of it. Now comes a farmer telling us he has 300 head of cabbage bursting in the field, that local firms don't buy; also cucumbers by the wagon load he cannot market at home. He explains that they could be bought at home almost as cheap as the freight amounts to on outside stuff coming in. Why get garden truck, fruit, spuds, etc all hauled in at a high price if you can buy a better quality at a lower, or the same, price from our home producer. Everybody can have a "trade at home" campaign, if our producers offer products for sale.

Mr. Burdick, the power and light man, has made out a \$5000 bond for good faith, has signed a contract to furnish four 100 watt light free for the city, and two large electric signs for the Vernonia Power Co. and also to employ a line patrolman and install a trouble telephone line along the electric high tension right-of-way. Mr. Burdick comes highly recommended, he is dealing on property here and several Portland firms have been induced by him to locate in Vernonia. He is endeavoring to have power and light working in our city before next March.

PORTLAND-ASTORIA HIGHWAY ASSURED

Clatsop County Asking Washington and Columbia to Co-operate

Astoria, Ore., Sept. 18, 1922.
St. Helens, Oregon.
Dear Sir: Will you kindly allow me space in your valuable paper to explain to your readers the position now occupied by the county court of Clatsop county, in regard to what is termed the "Inland Highway" from Portland to Astoria?

The county court of this county has taken this matter up with the chamber of commerce of this city, and other organizations here, and they are all very much interested and in favor of the same. Our representatives are very strong for the same and we are anxious for Columbia and Washington counties to join us, and put it up to the legislature at the next session in January.

The idea is to make a state road from Multnomah county through Washington and Columbia counties to Vernonia and on the present county road to or near Mist, and strike Clatsop county near Vesper. Clatsop county will make a first class roadbed to Vesper and I am informed that Washington county has a market road well near graded that could be turned over to the state. Our county will turn over a road graded from Astoria to the Columbia county line, and at least fifteen miles of hard-surfaced road.

Now, we want Columbia county to come forward and do their best, which I have no doubt they will. I have been reliably informed that your representative, Mr. Sherman Miles, is very strongly in favor of the same, which is very encouraging to us, and I will say that if he is a relative of old Sam Miles, he is a fighter, and they will get results. The people of these counties can not afford to let this chance go by as the timber is fast disappearing and if we fail to put in some permanent roads soon we will be left in a bad condition.

This proposed road will open a vast country which will in time support hundreds of families and will be a benefit to the entire state, as it will open up one of the most scenic roads in the state, and it will also relieve the travel on the present Columbia River highway, which will in a few years be unable to handle the travel with safety. What these counties must have is two state roads through them to the ocean, and then we will be able to keep up our side roads in good shape.

I believe that when this proposition is put before the people they will be convinced that it is the proper thing to do. I trust that Columbia and Washington counties will join us in this project and put it through at once. The longer we delay the worse it is for us as our timber is fast disappearing and when it is gone we will not be able to build these good roads as our main source of revenue will be gone forever.

FACTS WELL WRITTEN BY EDITOR VEATCH

The Rainier Review's editor was one of Vernonia's visitors, and devoted nearly two columns in his excellent paper to our big time and big opportunities. He complimented us on our hospitality, on our beautiful park and on our successful celebration. Read, in part, from his article, as follows:

"The railroad, which furnished the occasion for Vernonia's celebration, is 32.6 miles in length from Wilkesboro, which is 27 miles northwest of Portland. This is practically 60 miles of railroad. Its terminus is two miles beyond Keasey, which is two miles beyond the Columbia-Clatsop county line. Ultimately the line will extend to Astoria, it is said.

The new road extends on from Wilkesboro, which is the terminus of the United Railway line. It will be operated as an integral part of the Spokane, Portland & Seattle railway company, which company built the new road. The S. P. & S., in turn, is joint property of the Great Northern and Northern Pacific Railway Companies. Originally, this new line belonged to the Portland, Astoria & Pacific, and was projected by the American Lumber Company, control of which was acquired last November by the Central Coal & Coke Company of Kansas City, Mo.

It is a standard-built railway, designed to carry heavy traffic, for it will be used for many years, mostly for lumber and logs. Already about \$2,225,000 has been spent on the new railroad, not including equipment.

The railroad is only part of the boom that has come to Vernonia. Recently the Central Coal & Coke Company of Kansas City, Mo., has acquired 27,000 acres of timber land which formerly belonged to the David Eccles group, this tract of timber to be turned into lumber as soon as it is humanly possible to get the wheels turning in the big mill that is under construction at the edge of the city of Vernonia. The mill is being built of concrete and steel, which indicates the permanency of the plans of the company. A number of lesser holders of timber land are planning to operate, it is said, so that within the next few years this region will be one of the most active lumbering sections in Oregon.

Vernonia is indeed coming to the front. Columns of publicity have been given the little town on the upper Nehalem, by newspapers in all parts of this section of Oregon. The town is rapidly taking on the appearance of a real little city, and not only is the appearance there, but the actual building and planning of the foundation is there. Only last week, a \$52,000 franchise was granted for the installation of a hydro-electric system that will furnish the city its own electric light and power, and plans are about ready for the installation of a water system. What was a backwoods village a year ago is now a thriving, active town with excellent promise which she will keep.—Rainier Review.
