Her father was a harpist, the son of an orchestra leader, and her mother was a singer. At the age of six she was playing the harp in her father's orchestra. With this family musical background, the talented young girl was inspired to pursue her musical studies in New York, studying harp under Francis Pinto and singing under Mrs. DeMoss in that city.

Miss Linrud is not unknown to the music-loving public of the Northwest. Radio fans have already enjoyed the soothing, ethereal notes of her harp and melodious soprano voice, broadcasted by the Post-Intelligencer at Seattle.
