COLUMBIA COUNTY FAIR

Plans are being made to make this year's county fair, to be held in St. Helens, September 19, 20, 21, the largest and best that has ever been held. It is hoped that this year will be the last time it is necessary to hold the fair on the St. Helens grounds as plans are being made to move the grounds to some county-owned location that will afford more room and give a more central site, thereby benefitting the entire county.

However, there is a county-wide interest in the coming fair and many persons from all parts of the county are giving their time and thought to make this a real representative exhibition of the county's many agri-

cultural resources. Horticulture, dairying, stock raising, especially hog production, bee-keeping and boys and girls' club work will receive much attention and will be well represented in the exhibits.

A new amusement feature is the horse-shoe pitching contest open to individuals from all parts of the county and to teams of two players representing various communities of the county. Silver cups will be awarded to the winning teams and medals or other appropriate awards to winning individuals. Horse-shoe pitching has come strongly back into style and many teams are already practicing "barn-yard golf."

A new horse event, the showing and driving of heavy teams will take the place of the former uninteresting exhibition of horses. Large cash premiums are offered in this event. An eugenics clinic or contest will take the place of the former "pretty baby" show and specialists will be present to judge and advise in the health and care of babies.

From time to time new events and incidents of interest will be announced, as it is desired to awaken the whole county to the educational value of our county fair.
