GUN ACCIDENTS IN OREGON

Hunting accidents resulted in the leath of five persons and injury of ight others in Oregon during the fall Roseburg for a safety-first and fueleasons on deer, small game and birds. saving conference. This toll of human life was revealed

n the summary of accident reports state Game Commission. A careful heck of all fatalities and injuries has en supplied the commission through istrict deputy game wardens.

A total of ten counties are listed in the summary with Douglas County at the head of the list. One person

was killed and one injured in Douglas hunting accidents. Umatilla and Wal-Jackson and Yamhill, and one injury each was reported by Curry, Des-

chutes and Coos Counties. The most common mistake of be ieving a man to be a deer caused ficer Parrish. the death of two hunters and injury of two. The accidental discharge of guns killed three and injured two. Careless aim caused the injury of four persons.

It was not hunters alone who were killed or injured. One nine-year-old girl was killed by accidental disboy was injured for the same reason. Two other small boys were injured y the careless aim of a hunter.

Rifles were responsible for the leath of four persons and injury of four. Shotguns claimed five victims, of which one was killed.

The Oregon public service commission has revoked the certificate of operation issued to the Royal Blue stage lines on the ground that the corporation had allowed its liability and property damage insurance to expire. Stages have been operated by the company between Portland and Astoria.

The 1923 act of the Oregon legislature, creating county tax supervision and conservation commissions, was declared void because of defective title in a memoranda opinion handed down by the supreme court. A supplemental opinion setting out more fully the views of the court will be prepared later, it was announced. The opinion handed down by the supreme court in no way affects the tax supervising and conservation commission now in operation in Multnomah county. The Multnomah county commission was created by the legislature in 1919.

No emergency fund is available from which J. Frank Adams, of Klamath Falls, can be paid for dike construction performed by him something more than a year ago in process of reclaiming a part of Hank's marsh in Klamath county. It has been sug-

gested by American Legion officers at Klamath Falls that Contractor Adams should be paid for this work for which he submitted a bill for \$24.-956. Ex-Secretary of the Interior Lane undertook to arrange for the reclamation of Hank's marsh and other tule lands in the upper Klamath lake country on the basis of giving long-time leases on the land to be reclaimed to the contractors in return for their construction work. The American Legion post at Klamath Falls protested. however, and after bids had been received, the lowest of which on reclaiming Hank's marsh was submitted by Contractor Adams, the interior department decided to let no contracts. Adams proceeded with the work and submitted his bill for a part of it, which the department has refused to pay on the grounds that he was not authorized to go ahead.

Seldom has the country witnessed such universal approval of a tax reduction program as accorded Secretary Mellon's proposal.

This is probably due to the fact that the usual talk about tax reduction is confined to glittering generalities which will not embarrass : political condidate or public official with hard cold facts which must be substantiated.

Secretary Mellon has given the people the figures from which they can draw their own conclusions. Instead of sidestepping the issue, President Coolidge is outspoken in favor of the Mellon plan.

This has been a severe blow to political leaders who would have dodged the issue and delayed action untilafter the coming election.

With a definite program for tax reduction before them and with widespread approval of the plan being expressed from every section of the country, it is going to be hard for our representatives in Congress to justify delayed action which will cost the tax payers of this nation hundreds of millions of dollars.

If tax reduction is actually pushed to final consideration and passage, it FOUR-Vernonia Eagle 20636 will be through the triumph of enlightened public opinion over the preference of individual members of Congress to play personal politics at public expense.

E. B. Watters, postmaster at Stayton for the past two years, has been removed from office, following a visit of a postoffice inspector from Portland who, it was said, found the postmaster \$1200 or \$1300 short in his accounts. Miss Mildred English has been appointed acting postmaster.

There was only one fatality due to industrial accidents in Oregon during the week ending December 27, according to a report prepared by the state industrial accident commission. The victim was Robert Williams, a laborer, with headquarters at Prospect. A total of 505 accidents were reported.


A total of 33,549 applications for cash bonus and loans have been received, according to a report prepared by the world war veterans' state aid commission. Cash bonus applications paid aggregate 21,500, representing \$4,634,-360.00. Applications for loans paid by the commission total 4927 and aggregate \$12,237,300.

The Oregon supreme court, in an opinion written by Justice Brown, held that all the proceedings attending the issue and sale of bonds in the amount of \$2,200,000 by the Harney Valley Irrigation district were legal. The opinion affirmed the decree of Judge Dalton Biggs, who heard the case in the Harney county circuit court.
