

BIG NATIONAL REPUBLICAN CONVENTION IN CLEVELAND

1109 Delegates and 12,000 Spectators Witness Opening of Convention to Nominate Party Leaders

Republican Delegates from 48 states, three territories and one insular possession assembled in Convention Hall, Cleveland Tuesday, to nominate a National Ticket. Back of the stage, properly draped were the pictures of Lincoln, Harding and Roosevelt. Four hundred women delegates were in their seats on opening day. Representative Burton, the keynote orator brought the first out break of applause when he said "The Republican Party Stands now as it always has for Law Enforcement." The people have confidence in Coolidge. The nomination of Coolidge was counted on long before the Convention. It is a Coolidge Convention and Coolidge is spoken of as depending on more than Congress.
