They have filed their reports, and these reports show that 18,000 were killed and 100,000 injured during the year. That is an average of about 346 killed every week, 50 every day, during the year. And that you may know where Uncle Sam places the blame, here is what the report says: "Many vehicles of safe design and construction are being operated in an unsafe condition due to lack of care on the part of the owners, a condition which can be corrected only by directing the attention of each vehicle owner and operator to his responsibility toward himself and other users of the highway."

WORKING CHILDREN

The organizations that are backing the child-labor law, and trying to get an amendment to the constitution giving congress power to regulate it and to control the employment of children up to the age of 18 years are moving heaven and earth to accomplish their ends. Already 38 states have laws regulating child-labor and fixing the hours of employment. These state laws provide for protecting child labor from certain dangerous occupations. No one advocates or wants to make a law forbidding boys and girls to work for wages before they are 18 either on the farm or in any other suitable place. No state has yet passed such a law, but it is an open question whether the people should give congress any jurisdiction over this matter and law the founda-

tion for an army of federal employees to interfere with our children. We believe the average Vernonia resident feels that he is already being assessed a sufficient sum to operate the government. We don't believe anyone, in this community at least, is anxious to have additional taxes added just to support another bureau at Washington that would provide several thousand fat jobs and accomplish nothing more than is now being accomplished by state laws. And if other communities view it in the same light this talk about a child-labor amendment to the constitution might as well cease now.
