GERMANY'S ELECTION

Only a few weeks have elapsed since the election in Germany, and yet within that brief space the world has had an opportunity to realize that the result was for the best interest of that country in particular and her sister nations in general. The rebuke given old Ludendorff and his political allies has served to strengthen the confidence of the outside world in Germany's desire to live up to the Dawes plan in the strictest sense.

The election was not close enough to cause fear that the present officials will not be able to continue their program of putting Germany on her feet. The majorities were sufficient to show that Germany is weary of struggling along under constantly increasing debts and getting nowhere, that she wants an opportunity to start up her factories again and to pay off by the installment plan, as the Dawes plan enables her to do, the vast sums that she became obligated for through the foolish ambitions of a ruler whose greed disrupted the nation that trusted him.

It's hard for us to sit back in our comfortable homes in Vernonia and picture the huge tasks and the dark problems that confront those living away out across the sea. Here the past holds no regret for us, and the future is bright and cheery. We feel sometimes that we are burdened by excessive taxation, and yet we soon toss this belief aside when we stop to figure how much more back-breaking are the burdens of those war-torn Bolshevik-threatened nations over there. Let us hope that while the future promises so much for all of us in America that a goodly measure of cheer and encouragement will fall to the lot of those in the old world.

TRAINING PARENTS

Today we hear a great deal about the training of children; but what about the training of parents. It is too much the custom at the present day to place the blame for the young man or young woman who has gone wrong on the schools, the colleges, or the churches, but none of these institutions is originally charged with the bringing up of children. It is in the home that the child is raised, and it is in the home that it ought to be cared for. All other factors in the shaping of the character of the boy or girl, good or bad, are more or less external.

Why then should not more attention be devoted to the training of parents?

It has been asserted by one of the leaders in social welfare work in Chicago that there are in that city about 2,000,000 youths who are entirely beyond their parents control. Almost every large city tells a similar story. One of the commonest things we hear today is that our young people are hurrying headlong to Hades. A leading criminologist of New York says that it is because the parents are showing them the way. He says that it is lack of religion, and that any religion is better than no religion at all. By religion is meant a system of ethics that have a divine sanction and

that have directive and corrective influences.

When the home becomes a sleeping place, and nothing omre, family life has decayed; when parents and children dine out (but not together) and the evenings are spent at entertainments where each member of the family goes his way or her way, it may be considered independence and freedom, and various other things that are supposed to be characteristic of a free and enlightened age; but it is

simply a wholesale smashing up of elements inestimably precious in our civilization.
