### POST OFFICE BILL

Twenty years ago one of the best known names in national advertising was James Pyle's Pearline. The advertising had run continuously since 1873.

In 1907, the concern having passed into the hands of an estate, the trustees saw an opportunity by which they could save many hundreds of dollars by cutting out the advertising.

Pearline lost favor rapidly and in 1914 tried to come back. Several hundred thousand dollars were spent which amount would have made a considerable dent on the market for a new product, but Pearline was not a new product. It was trying to come back, which is infinitely more difficult and it did not succeed.

Another nationally known product stopped advertising for one year—and it took from five to seven years to regain the volume it lost.

A merchant can build up a business with persistent advertising. But few who once become advertisers ever follow in the footsteps of Pearline.
