The Children Get a Better Deal

INDIANA BONE DRY BILL IS  
PASSED BY HOUSE-SENATE

Indianapolis, Feb. 18. — (United News)—The Wright "bone dry" bill, a sweeping, drastic prohibition measure, which is expected to make Indiana one of the driest states in the nation, has passed both houses of the Indiana legislature and awaits only the governor's signature to become a law.

The measure is designated to make conviction of liquor law violators easier and to make sentences heavier.

### Business vs. Booze

The Northwestern Christian Advocate in an editorial answers the question, "What becomes of the money that used to be used for booze?"

"Five years ago the prophets said that in prohibition the hotel business had received a mortal blow. Great hotels have been built in a thousand cities since then; the business is a respectable rival of radio, the movies and the automobile in its attractiveness to capital seeking profitable investment.

Facts such as these could be given in large variety and in endless detail. They help to answer the question, "What becomes of the money which used to be spent for booze?"

"Prohibition, as everybody knows, is here to stay. But it is the business of every decent citizen to see that lawlessness isn't. In most communities the crystallized sentiment is strong, at any moment, to put the bootlegger out of business."

### By-Products of Prohibition

A survey was recently conducted by the Christian Science Monitor, when the heads of organizations representing 13,500,000 Americans, were interviewed. It was reported then: "The results of this extensive inquiry are significant and encouraging. Replies indicate that instead of the threatened collapse of the dry sentiment, the prohibition forces were never stronger than they are right now. Prohibition, it seems from the Monitor survey, has virtually nothing to fear, although watchfulness on the part of those whose special duty it is to support and enforce the law is vitally necessary. The great body of stable thought which has been shown to be back of prohibition carries with it the assurance that, given a reasonable length of time and the continued, active support of the Christian people of the United States, the opposition of the prohibition amendment will fade away into complete insignificance.

### "Save America"

Eighteen hundred women representing ten million other women went to Washington recently. They represented thirty-nine states and a multitude of American mothers. They went as crusaders with banners flying. And the banners read, "Save America" and "Enforce the Law." These women represented the best of intelligent patriotic America. They were women who believe in this country and who see a grave peril in the growing disregard for the laws of the land. They believe with the wisest philosophers of the ages that the surest way to obtain just laws is to enforce the present laws. And they believe that the laws of our land are good laws if enforced, but destructive to the life of the Republic if held up to scorn.

This Woman's National Committee for Law Enforcement held a convention for one week at the national capital. They brought together the best minds in their numbers and also enlisted the support of national leaders. President Coolidge received them in the White House. He commended their work.

Among the groups of women who met in this conference and consecrated themselves to law enforcement were The General Federation of Women's Clubs, The Daughters of the American Revolution, The National Parent-Teacher Association, The King's Daughters, and the W. C. T. U.

The strength of this great army of women lies in their unanswerable demand for the enforcement of the laws of the land. They do not ask for new laws—but they insist that the acid test of application be given to the laws that now stand on the books.

fate of the American people collectively and into the health—the very life—of young American individual. It has become the order of the day to laugh at the law. Conscience is sleeping among great numbers of people. We race along thoughtlessly or defiantly until suddenly tragedy blocks the way.

Those of us who are hurt—and sooner or later most of us who defy the law are hurt—pay a bitter price. Ten million women is a force which, if it stands solidly on a moral issue, must be reckoned with by the nation.
