Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Bridges, Miss Olga Holmstron and Raymal Johnson took an auto trip to Astoria Sunday.

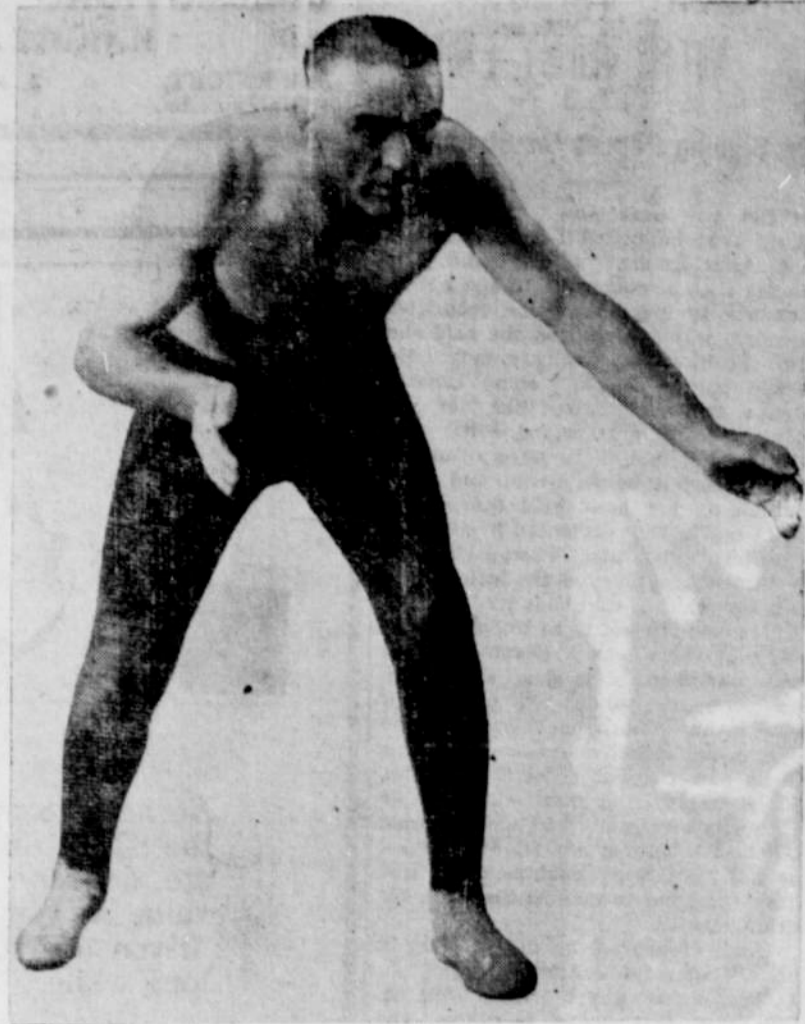
"Freddie" Foster was a Sunday visitor at the Jepson home.
