

Ordinance No. 108

AN ORDINANCE levying an assessment upon the lots, parts of lots and parcels of land in Improvement District No. 1; providing for the entry of such assessments in the docket of City Liens; providing for the notice to be given to the property owners of the levy thereof; and declaring an emergency.

WHEREAS, heretofore on the 16th day of February, 1925, the Council of the City of Vernonia, Columbia County, Oregon, did apportion the cost of the construction of the improvements in Improved District No. 1, upon the lots, parts of lots and parcels of land adjudged by the Council to be directly or indirectly benefitted thereby and when it had ascertained what it deemed a just apportionment of said costs, in accordance with the benefit, directly or indirectly, derived by each lot and part of lot or parcel of land within the improvement district: adjudged to be so benefitted, did make a proposed assessment; and

public places in said City for a period of fifteen (15) days, which notice did specify the whole cost of said improvement, the share so apportioned to each lot or parcel of land, with the names of the owners thereof, and stating that any objections to such apportionment may be made in writing to the Council and filed with the Recorder within fifteen (15) days from the date of the first posting of said notice, and that such objections will be heard and determined by the Council before the passage of any ordinance assessing the cost of said improvement and further stating the time at which said matter would come up for hearing before the Council, to-wit: the 16th day of March, 1925; and

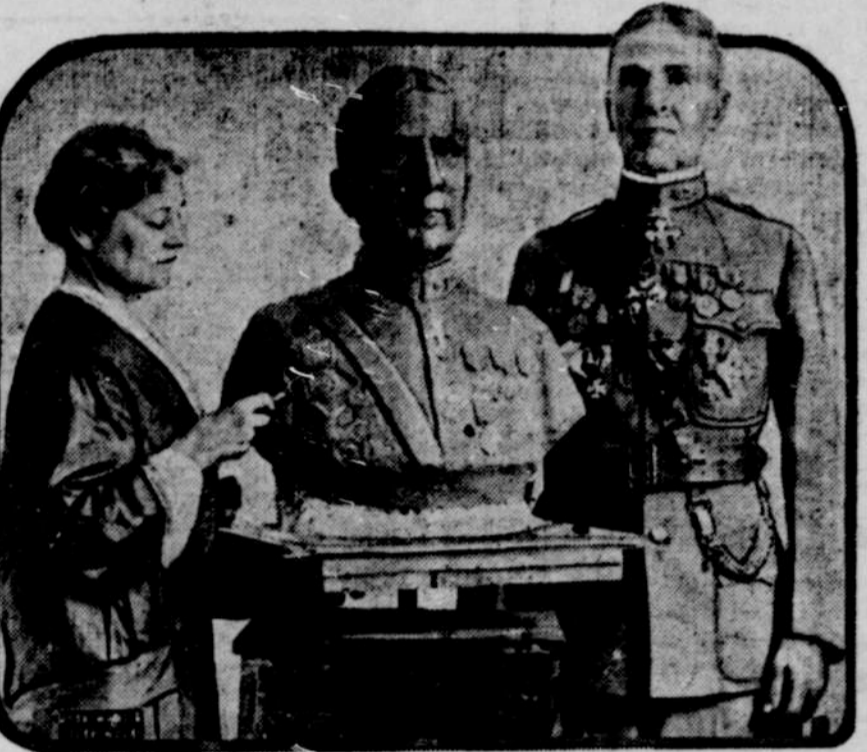
Section 2. The Recorder is hereby directed to make entry of the foregoing assessments in the docket of City Liens, which docket shall contain,

- 1. The number or letter of lot, part of lot or parcel of land assessed and the number or letter of the block in which it is situated.
2. The name of the owner thereof, or that the name of the owner is unknown.
3. The sum assessed upon such lot, or part thereof, or parcel of land and the date of the entry.

Seeding to clover and rape in June is the surest method of obtaining a clean stand of clover in Oregon, as shown by experiment station results. It is very essential that the land be plowed early and thoroughly cultivated before seeding. This method will conserve the soil moisture causing a surer growth of the clover.

Oregon berry growers find the grape hoe to be one of the best tools for cultivating close to the berry vines. This tool saves both the horse and the plants the experiment station finds. The implement has several attachments all fastened to an arm. This enables the operator to cultivate nearer the vines than the horse is able to walk. The grape hoe is easily guided with the disk wheel which is fastened at the end of one of the handles.

Where clover or alfalfa seed is to be planted alone it may often be sown with a grain drill through the grain seed attachment. One of the best ways of doing this is to loosen the pressure springs on the disks so they will not be too deeply in the ground. It is better if the land itself is thoroughly rolled previous to sowing. A double disk drill is better than any other common type used in Oregon, since it does not penetrate so deeply or leave the land furrowed. Sowing with the drill the college experiment station finds is dangerous on loose mellow soil as the seed will be planted too deeply.

Oregon potato growers, especially on red hill soil, have obtained a marked increase in yields from the use of superphosphate as a fertilizer. The experiment station recommends 300 pounds as the average application.

Oregon berry growers find that black raspberries should be pruned back 4 to 6 inches in the latter part of May. The young shoots are usually approximately two feet high at this time. The experiment station points out that this causes branching and fruit bud formation during the rest of the summer.
