Portland, Or., May 5.—(Special)—Names of 2670 settlers interested in Oregon's agricultural opportunities were received yesterday by the Land Settlement department of the Portland Chamber of Commerce from H. W. Byerly, general immigration agent of the Northern Pacific Railway company, as a result of the joint advertising campaign conducted by the three transcontinental lines co-operating in developing the Northwest.

This new list is in addition to 2655 inquiries received by the department in March from the co-operating lines and an additional 1000 received earlier in the year. A total of more than 10,000 inquiries have been received since the first of the year, according to W. Q. Ide, manager.

She has enjoyed fairly good health, only beginning to fail on account of age about a year ago. At the time of her death she was with a daughter in Rainier. The remains were laid to rest in the Vernonia cemetery last Wednesday. She died May 11, 1925.
