

HILLSBORO PLANS FOURTH CELEBRATION

Items of interest are the horse shoe contest which will decide the Washington county championship, and is open to all residents of the county. Among the athletic events and sports there will be a shoe race. Each entrant is requested to remove his shoes and they will be placed in a pile.
