### FARM POINTERS

All ages and varieties of Oregon fruit trees are attacked by flat borers. The young trees probably suffer the most seriously, says the experiment station. A high percentage of young trees are killed their where high temperature and prolonged drouth occur. The borer attacking apple trees works mostly just under the bark, at or above the surface of the ground.

Drainage in experimental fields at O. A. C. has doubled the crop yield. Before drainage on some lands the yield was so small that profit was uncertain. The larger crop obtained after drainage has made good profit.

Most pigs marketed in Oregon are light weight, and are therefore growing as well as putting on fat during the finishing period. To get the best results, careful attention is given to balancing the rations so that

enough protien and mineral matter will be provided to develop muscle and bone, the experiment station has found. The finishing period need not exceed 60 days unless a rising market warrants longer feeding.

The average weight of the Oregon fleece is \$9 pounds aoin rdlu gkij fleece is 9 pounds, more than a pound better than the average weight for the country which is reported as 7 to 8 pounds in 1922. The national average was raised from 1.85 pounds in 1841 to its present size, and is still improving with careful selection of stock. It is significant, says the experiment station authorities, to note that many bands in Oregon average 10 pounds. Careful culling of poor fleece bearers is being conducted by different growers with a view to raise the average weight still more.

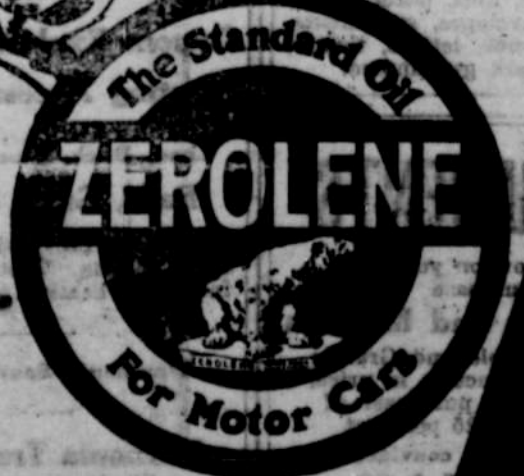
