

THE MAIL ORDER HOUSES AND THE FALL TRADE

These days when the products of the summer's activities are being marketed and the holidays are approaching constitute the harvest time of the mail order houses. They are out after the fall trade this year stronger than ever, if we are to judge by the lavishness of their advertising. There is scarcely an incoming mail that does not bring The Eagle orders for advertising from mail order houses, frequently accompanied by cash, and scarcely an outgoing mail that does not take the orders and cash back again for all the advertising is promptly refused.

Appropos of all this, the current Pacific Coast Bulletin, published by the Pacific Coast Coal company, contains "The Ten Commandments of the Mail Order House," which is worth reading. It is here reproduced:

I. Thou shalt not have other merchants but us.

II. Covet thy neighbor's business, and convert them to thy faith in us and loan them copy of our catalogue.

III. Sell thy farm products to thy local merchant, but send us thy cash.

IV. When thou are broke, sick or in trouble, go to thy local merchant for credit, for we do a strictly cash business.

V. Pay thy taxes promptly and keep up good roads to haul our merchandise from the depot for we pay no local improvements.

VI. Have faith in what we say for we do not know thee, and all we want is thy cash.

VII. Search our catalogues diligently for in them thou thinkest thou canst save money; and pick out a lot of nonsense that thou dost need to get the freight minimum.

VIII. Ask thy local firms for charity donations but order thy church bell from us.

IX. Send thy money with thy order for we do not accept C. O. D. business.

X. If thy selection from our catalogue amounts to \$30.00 send three ten-dollar bills; we do not charge anything on "Next Half" payroll.
