

MAYOR'S PROCLAMATION
I, the undersigned, Mayor of the City of Vernonia, Oregon, do hereby proclaim that at the special election held in the City of Vernonia, on the 18th day of November, 1925, a certain proposed amendment to the charter of said City was duly adopted by the legal voters of said city, by the following vote.

Number of votes cast for the Amendment 99
Number of votes cast against the Amendment 72
Majority of votes cast for the amendment 27

CHARTER AMENDMENT SUBMITTED TO THE VOTERS BY THE COUNCIL

AN ACT
To amend Section 48 of Chapter VII of the Charter of the City of Vernonia, Oregon, entitled and adopted by the people of the City of Vernonia on the 7th day of November, 1922, relating to the power and authority of the Council to read as follows:

Section 48, To assess, levy and collect taxes for general municipal purposes, not exceeding Two (2) per cent per annum of all property, both real and personal, except as otherwise provided in this act, within the corporate limits of said city, without exemption from indebtedness; said taxes to be collected under the general laws of the State of Oregon

And I, do hereby further proclaim that at said Special election the legal voters, voted to levy a tax for the year 1926, which exceeds by more than six (6) per cent the tax levied by the City of Vernonia, for the preceding year, by levying a tax of Fourteen Thousand One Hundred Seventy Five Dollars (\$14,175.00).

Number of votes cast against the increase of tax 69
Majority of votes cast for the increase of tax 35
