We believe you will like it, as we see nothing but the best on the new releases offered. Some are better than others but some are liked by people who have different ideas of entertainment.

We start this Saturday with two great stars, Richard Barthelmess and Dorothy Gish in the great production entitled: "The Beautiful City."
