The Western Spar company at Columbia City have moved into their new office, which is a great improvement over their old building. A furnace has been installed.

Mildred and Billie Scarberg, of Bachelor Flat, three miles from St. Helens are suffering with tonsillitis.

Mrs. Cleve Mellinger of Vernonia was a guest of friends in Bachelor Flat recently.

Ex-County Judge White and Miss Nan Lillich of Columbia Heights entertained recently ex-county sheriff H. E. LaBare and wife of St. Helens.

The oil well interest near Scappoose have received 4000 feet more of 6-inch casing. They are now over 3000 feet deep and will continue drilling. This well is located near Havlick's corner on the Dutch Canyon road.
