St. Helens is having a hard time to decide where they will locate a pond to hold their stray dogs.

The farmers of Warren feel satisfied that this year the fruit crop will exceed all previous years.

The interior of the First National bank at Scappoose has been redecorated and renovated.

A large bush of Marie Henriette red roses have broken into bloom at Clatskanie.

Mrs. Geo. N. Johnson of Rainier expects to start a kindergarten class there in May.

Small damage resulted in a fire in the boiler room of the St. Helens broom factory there recently.

Arvo, Leinonen, 13, of Quincy was accidentally shot recently when a small caliber bullet lodged in his knee.

Tom Hartsock, St. Helens war veteran, has been transferred from the Portland veterans hospital to Walls Walla, Washington, for further care.

Von A. Gray was chosen a director for the St. Helens school district to take the place caused by the death of N. O. Larabee.

Jack Foster, 33, employed at a mill in Columbia City, suffered a broken leg and bruises in an accident there recently.

St. Helens is now connected with six circuits installed by the Pacific Telephone company at an estimated expenditure of \$50,000.

Harold J. Eiswald, three months old son of Mr. and Mrs. John Eiswald of West Rainier died Tuesday morning, a victim of whooping-cough.

Ernest Harding of Clatskanie was struck and ran over by the wheels of an auto when he started across a street, became confused and dodged back in front of the car.

Train crews of the Nehalem Timber company near Scappoose are working overtime in order to supply demands for logs before any possibility of forest fires looms up.

Residents of Clatskanie were over populated with eggs when a truck from Portland overturned near there recently, throwing eggs in all directions, about 130 cases in all.

Oscar Olsen, St. Helens longshoreman was fined \$50 and his drivers license suspended for one year by Recorder Beeler for driving a car while intoxicated at that place last week.

Asa Joles, 74, died at his home in West St. Helens Monday after an illness of long duration. Deceased is survived by his widow. Interment was in the Deer Island cemetery.

A burning flu in the kitchen of Novak's confectionery at Scappoose caused a general alarm there recently. Slight damage was caused to the store from water.

Charles Woolpert, 85, and father of Mrs. C. E. Lawe is visiting at the Lake home in St. Helens. He will return to his home in Indiana soon.

In response to a message stating that his mother was suffering from a severe attack of la grippe and her condition was regarded grave, Hugh S. Mason of St. Helens left recently for Des Moines, Iowa, to be at her bedside. Mrs. Mason is 89 years old.

John Turner, Rainier's only colored boy, was sentenced to six months in the county jail on a bootlegging charge at Rainier. During the raid at his boathouse shots were fired before he was subdued.

Mrs. Martha Kelly, 44, wife of Frank Kelly, died suddenly at her home in West St. Helens from heart trouble Sunday. The husband and three sons and her father survive. Interment was in the Yankton cemetery.

St. Helens will soon have a Piggly Wiggly store, when they leased the building formerly occupied by the

First National bank, according to J. B. Thompson, cashier. No date for the formal opening has been announced.

The St. Helens chamber of commerce is launching plans to build a community hall there to house all civic entertainments and doings, and also a place for the American Legion and a drill hall for the local guard unit as present quarters are inadequate.

Carl Aamand of St. Helens suffered a badly bruised, or probably broken arm, when he caught it in between two blocks on a crane in a local quarry there as he was oiling the mechanism. He was taken to a St. Helens hospital.

Fire which started from undetermined origin, caused a damage of several hundred dollars to a tailor shop belonging to J. F. Ryan on the water front in St. Helens last week, endangered adjoining buildings, and would have probably wiped the whole side street out but for the timely arrival of the fire department.

The water rate for St. Helens is now a \$2 minimum, the same as before but 400 cubic feet of water is allowed instead of 300 before, and the rate for each 100 cubic feet over the 400 is 15 cents per hundred. The council also passed an ordinance authorizing the issuance of \$3051.04 in bonds to pay for street improvements.
