Deputy Sheriff Burrel Graves, of the tax department at St. Helens is taking an enforced vacation doctoring a case of poison oak.

The Clark & Wilson Logging company, operating logging camps at WMark are using up the entire output of three sides.

The Columbia County Rod & Gun club will officially open their new traps on the fair grounds Sunday morning, May 2.

The Columbia River Fishermen's union has fixed the price for raw Chinook salmon at 16 cents per pound for the 1926 season.

Mrs. Elizabeth Mabel Oglivie, 32, Rainier, died at the Memorial hospital in Longview. She is survived by her widower a son and a daughter

Owing to crowded conditions in the county jail at St. Helens, several prisoners have been removed to the Multnomah county jail.

Ladies of the Eastern Star order in Rainier gave a cooked food sale that netted over \$25 to aid in building a children's Masonic home at Forest Grove.

Paul C. Adams of Warren has been appointed Oregon manager for the Northwest Holstein Breeders' association comprising Oregon, Washington Idaho and Utah.

The Columbia County Rod & Gun club is watching with interest the establishment of the traps and concrete shooting stands on their new grounds at the fair grounds. They will be completed soon.

Miss Annabelle Isbister of St. Helens, who is now a student of O. A. C. and who will graduate this term, will teach in the Beaverton high next year.

An S. P. & S. train struck an auto driven by Sylvester Hardy at Westport Sunday morning dragging it for 75 feet. The car was demolished and the occupants escaped with cuts and bruises.

Supt. Robinson of the Rainier high school visited the Warren school recently and presented them with the cup competed and won for by the members of the Warren baseball team.

The first carload of certified potatoes to be shipped from Columbia county has been shipped by Hammer brothers west of Deer Island. The car was shipped to California.

William Reid, mayor of Rainier suffered a broken leg when a large telephone pole, which he was helping to move, slipped and caught his left leg beneath the peavy he was using.

The Berkenfield Lumber company have purchased the timber on Walter Carls place at Berkenfield. The company formerly logged near Natal on the McMullen place.

Work on the extensive paper mill at St. Helens is being rushed and it is probable that contractors will have completed various buildings by the time specified, June 1.

county school superintendent, made vacant by the resignation of O. A. Anderson. Miss Murray has taught in the Clatskanie schools for several years.

Mrs. Tom Baker, who teaches in the Yankton school was taken to a St. Helens hospital, suffering from injuries sustained when a light coupe in which she was riding with her husband skidded on wet pavement near Scappoose, slightly injuring Mr. Baker and wrecking the car.

Francis Morgan of Columbia City was severely injured while working as a brakeman in the Oregon American logging camp near Keasey. A log struck him injuring his back severely and breaking his leg, states the Review.

John Rumerick, Scappoose, was killed in Portland when on a motorcycle he was driving he turned his head to look around and ran into a tree. He was a member of the high school football team and baseball and has many friends who sorrow at his sudden death.

Charles Bartholomy, of Houlton, charged with shooting an Irish setter dog belonging to Louis Kestene, deputy sheriff of Columbia county, pleaded not guilty to the charge in the court of Justice Storia in St. Helens.

F. W. Smith, a cement contractor, who arrived in St. Helens from Longview for the purpose of contracting and made a big splash by buying a farm and everything else that could be bought on the installment plan has "flew the coop" says the Sentinel. He also owed several bills for labor to men he had employed.
