FORM CALF CLUB - County Agent Nelson while in Clatskanie formed a calf club of five boys.

RECOVERING FROM TYPHOID - Wesley Knauf of Rainier is rapidly recovering from an attack of typhoid fever which has confined him to his home for several weeks.

PIGEON KILLED - One of Miss Dorothy Girt's pet pigeons of Alston was killed on the highway while they were visiting in The Dalles.

GUARD GETS BROWNING - New equipment, including eight Browning machine rifles have been received by the St. Helens unit of the Oregon National Guard.

CANNERY OPERATING - The Scappoose strawberry canning plant has been operating to full capacity the past few days, neighboring farmers bringing in fine quality of berries.

PICNIC AT CLATSKANIE - The senior class students of the Rainier high school, about 35 in number went on a picnic excursion to Clatskanie.

COUNTY ADDS VOTERS - An increase of 800 is shown in the registration of voters in Columbia county as compared with last year, 612 republicans and 188 democrats.

YOUNG GIRL DIES - Margaret Chittie, 20, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert J. Chittie, died at her home in South Rainier last week, after an illness of two weeks with pneumonia.

BOY ELECTED PRESIDENT - Bergin Bellville, St. Helens, has been elected president of the sophomore class for next year by a majority of 12 votes at the Oregon Agricultural college at Corvallis.

CLINIC AT YANKTON - A free clinic for children under the school age was held at Yankton this week, conducted by Miss Little, county nurse.

MEETING WILL BE HELD - The annual meeting of the Nehalem Pioneers' association will be held on Saturday, June 12 in the school gymnasium at Berkenfeld, beginning at 10 a. m.

NEW CITY LOTS - The Hammond Lumber company is having a 40-acre tract of their cut over land surveyed and cut up into city lots and acre tracts south of the Rainier city limits.

RECEIVES INJURY - While practicing at pole vaulting before the grade school track meet, Howard Forrest of Rainier suffered a broken and dislocated elbow.

RETURN FROM VISIT - Mrs. G. A. Bitar and daughter, Julia, of Rainier, have returned home from a trip to Australia, reaching Astoria Saturday night, where they were met by Mr. Bitar. They left Rainier June 10 of last year.

CLASS TO GRADUATE - Thirty-seven students will graduate from the St. Helens high school at services to be conducted there at the new high school May 21.

GETS RELIC - St. Helens has participated in the distribution of war relics given to Oregon by the federal government and has received a much used and delapidated German canon, from appearance which has undergone much usage and considerable wear and tear.

FORFEITS BOND - Dr. W. A. Clark, arrested by Marshal Connor at St. Helens on a charge of drunkenness and disturbing the peace and later released on bond fixed at \$50, and failing to appear for pleading his bond was forfeited by the St. Helens recorder.

INSPECT FIELD - Approximately 500 people saw the inspection of the Freeman aviation field at Scappoose Dan Freeman, of whom the field is named is one of Scappoose's "old timers" and is always interested in the development and betterment of the community.

FISH IS COSTLY - After he had pleaded guilty to a charge of fishing without a license, Justice Stora of St. Helens imposed a fine of \$25 and costs on A. Gustafson of Portland. He was arrested while fishing in Scappoose bay.

CAR BURNS - Floyd McKay, of Scappoose, while motoring in the vicinity of The Dalles last week had the misfortune to have the car he was driving turn over and burn. No one was injured.

WILD MURDER RUMOR - Sheriff Wellington has been busy denying that a murder had been committed in the Yankton neighborhood as no one has been found murdered or missing.

PARKING NEARS COMPLETION - The grading of the new parking strip at Scappoose, which extends from the highway to the property of the S. P. & S. railroad and along the main street has been completed and shrubs and lawn will be planted.

IS CHICKEN KING - Julius Ziestmann of Scappoose is fast becoming chicken king of Columbia county. He has recently received 1600 one-day-old chickens to add to his large poultry flock.

ROSE IS HONORED - The Congregational church at St. Helens honored the rose at a special sermon at that church last Sunday. The church was beautifully decorated with all flowers grown in the St. Helens and adjacent districts and floral offerings were entered by St. Helens lodges and civic bodies to which a cup was given the winner.

JURY TERM OPENS - A new list of 18 jurors were drawn and the grand jury empaneled at the opening session of the May circuit court. The grand jury comprises Thomas Morris Sr., Norman D. McCullum, Albert Johnson, P. E. Lovgren, H. Henry O'Leen, Wm. Ketel and James Knorr.

SERVICE EXTENDED - Electric light poles are being set up in Columbia City and lights will be installed within a few days. As the line was not heavy enough to carry sufficient load to furnish the town, the service was not extended beyond the mill until its recent closing to which power had been previously furnished.

ANSWERS SUMMONS - Fred Adams, respected citizen of Deer Island died at his home there from an incurable disease. Mr. Adams was 63 years old and was born in England. He lived in Columbia county for the past 30 years, making his home in the Deer Island section continuous. He is survived by his widow and a daughter who lives in Portland. Interment was in the Scappoose cemetery.

CARD ROOM HAS FIRE - Fire was discovered in the Idle Hour card room at Rainier and was extinguished before the fire department arrived. Later fire again broke out from a warped firebox from which coals dropped through onto the wood floor. No large amount of damage was done.

WAGON OVERTURNS - A wagon in which Ralph Morgan, Scappoose, was riding went over the shoulder of the road near there. Mrs. Soder, a neighbor who was riding with him received two broken ribs and Mr. Morgan was badly bruised. The horses were unhurt, though considerably scarred.

BUILDS RESERVOIR - The Columbia City Water company have started work on a reservoir to hold approximately 200,000 gallons of water to be used for the supplying of the town. The reservoir will be of cement and will replace the spring from which the water is now taken. It will be located about a quarter mile back from the railroad.

LOGGING CAMP CLOSES - The Wespar Logging company at Warren has closed camp temporarily while adjustments are being made of the affairs of the West Spar Lumber Co., of Columbia City. The Wespar has contracted the sale of its logs to the Columbia City plant and, owing to its suspension, was compelled to follow suit. The last body of timber along the Columbia river in Columbia county will have disappeared when this tract is logged, about a year hence.

PUPILS HURST IN ACCIDENT - Overtaking of a bus loaded with school children near Clatskanie recently resulted in the injury of four students. Miss Ellen Edmunds, 15, was taken to a Portland hospital where it was discovered she had sustained a broken jaw and a lacerated left arm and a possible fracture of the skull. Fannie Niemensen suffered a broken collar bone and two ribs broken. Alice Stockberg sustained injuries to her back and George Anderson a sprained neck and cuts.
