Editorial

THE REASON AMERICA PROSPERS

FACTORY workers in New York City received an average of \$12.91 a week in December, 1914; in December, 1925, they received \$30.73. For January, 1926, even this last high pay was boosted to \$30.85 per worker. Wages have increased about 138 per cent. Living costs have increased about 70 per cent.

These figures, approximately, prevail all over the United States. It is from this surplus earning power that the country draws the pay for its autos, its radios, its new homes, its corporation stocks with 15,000,000 owners. While some industries and some sections of the country have not been uniformly prosperous, these figures show a general average. But everywhere there has been a lift in conditions.

TIME TELLS THE STORY

"UNLIMITED POWER SUPPLY" has been the incessant claim of the Hydro Electric Power Commission of Ontario, which operates a government-owned power system, but now comes the New York Times with a special dispatch to the effect that the International Paper company, through its subsidiary, the Gateneau Power company, a private concern has "averted a prospective power famine in the province of Ontario" by agreeing to furnish the government system with 230,000 to 260,000 horsepower of electrical energy a year for 30 years. The first block of purchased power will be delivered in 1928. This, says the Times, will meet a demand then expected, but which could not be met out of the supply which will at that time be under control of the commission. Thus one by one the claims of the much-lauded "Ontario Hydro" are refuted. First it was shown that "power at cots" was merely an empty slogan, then that rates charged varied widely and averaged higher than rates in United States under private ownership, and now we learn that the "Hydro" can not keep up with the demands of the territory in which it operates.

THE BIG THREE

REPORTS from many sections of the West show there is a noticeable revival in several branches of mining, gold in particular. Reports from lumber associations show that the demand for lumber is good or better than last year. While there is no boom on in the oil industry it is operating steadily and meeting a constantly growing demand.

The foregoing might be called the "big three" in Western industries—mining, lumber and oil. These industries are the mainstay of prosperity in conjunction with agriculture in all the states west of the Rocky mountains. Conditions which discourage or cripple any one of the three immediately hurt vast areas of country and destroy the market for agricultural products.

Every Western citizen should write the three words, mining, lumber and oil, on his memory and come to understand that everyone has an interest in these industries even though he has no direct connection with some mining, lumber or oil company. As we learn to protect and encourage our basic industries, we will automatically strengthen business conditions along permanent lines.
