### **BOON TO FARMERS**

Postmäster General Harry S. New declared the rural free delivery service to be "one of the most indispensable features of the American social and economic life," in his address before the thousand deligates attending the convention of the Rural Letter Carriers' Association in Philadelphi the other day.

"This invaluable service cannot be curtailed," he said. "It carries mail to and from more than 30,000,000 persons residing in the rural districts of the United States. Every reasonably well-populated district in this country, which has an area of 3,026,000

square miles, is reached by carrier."
"The superiority of our service as compared with that of other countries is so great as to leave no room for contrast. Last year the average cost per carrier was \$2,304. The average salary yer carrier was \$1,877-


