Suggested Menu For Thanksgiving Dinner

(From School of Home Economics O. A. C.)

The Thanksgiving dinner is simple with plenty of well cooked food served attractively. The following menu is suggested:

Fruit cocktail or bouillon with pimento garnish, toasted crackers. Roast chicken or turkey with dressing. Pickle relish, giblet, gravy, cider, ice. Duchess potatoes, baked squash. Parker house rolls—Cranberry jelly salad, mayonnaise.—Individual pumpkin pies or carrot pudding, hard sauce.

The turkey or chicken is attractively decorated with a cranberry necklace, the platter garnished with parsley and radish curls. Nuts of different kinds added to the dressing give variety.

Duchess potatoes: To two cups of hot well-mashed potatoes add two tablespoons butter, one half teaspoon salt and yolks of two eggs slightly beaten. Pile on an oiled baking sheet in individual servings, brush over with a beaten egg diluted with one teaspoon of water, and brown in oven.

Cranberry salad: Stew four cups fresh cranberries and rub through sieve. Cook three minutes, add two cups sugar and cook two minutes more. Cool and add 1 1/2 cups walnut meats. Put in individual molds and chill. Garnish with parsley and curly celery.

Carrot pudding: Combine one cup each of grated carrot, grated potato, ground suet, brown sugar, raisins and nuts. Add, after sifting together, 1 1/2 cups flour and one teaspoon each of soda, salt, cinnamon nutmeg, and allspice. Fill oil molds two thirds full and steam one to five hours depending on the size of the molds. Serve hot with hard sauce.

Cider ice: Make a syrup by boiling 1 1/2 cups sugar with four cups water for 10 minutes. Add one quart sweet cider, two cups orange juice and one half cup lemon juice. Cool, strain and freeze.

FARM REMINDERS

Presence of discoloration in the stem and vascular region of the potato in Oregon has been found in many year's work at the experiment station to be an unreliable index of the presence of disease-producing organisms. It cannot safely be relied upon as the sole guide in separating sound from diseased stock for planting. More than 12,000 tubers were examined in finding these facts out.

The only method of controlling blight of apple and pear trees in Oregon that has proved at all successful is cutting out all the diseased parts, burning them and disinfecting the wounds. This work promptly and thoroughly done holds the disease to a minimum, but does not always prevent recurrence the following year.

Interplanting of Ettersburg 121 strawberries with other varieties for pollination has been found effective by Oregon growers as well as by the state college. Nearly all commercial plantings of this variety have been interplanted at one time or another to get them to bear fruit on the terminal blossoms. Pollen from other varieties proved no more effective than pollen of its own variety.

The most injurious cutworms in Oregon spend the winter as immature caterpillars in the soil, says the experiment station. They are present in the spring and all set for a foray on the new crops as soon as the plants push their tops through the soil.

Bee colonies may be so well prepared for winter in Oregon as to require no attention from late October to early March, says the bee

specialist of the experiment station. The three essentials of preparation are large colony, abundant stores, and winter protection. As many as 15,000 young workers in addition to the old, and no less than 40 to 50 pounds of honey, are needed.

Cost of Producing Beef \$60 For Two Year Old

To produce a two-year old beef animal ready for market in the Blue mountain districts of eastern Oregon costs close to \$60, as found in a cost of production investigation by the state college extension service.

The cost of maintaining the cow for a year is about \$23, analyzed in such business-like way as a banker analyzes his business. It was found that the average calf crop brought successfully to weaning age is only 65 per cent that is, for every hundred head of cows carried 65 weaned calves are returned. This makes the cost of the weaned calf \$35, a rate of \$7.75 per hundred for weanlings weighing 450 pounds.

The calf is ordinarily kept till it

is two years old, when it is turned into the breeding herd to replace cows lost or culled if it is a heifer, or sent to market if a steer. An average death loss of 5 per cent is figured in, thus increasing the cost above that required for maintenance.

The average annual turnover in a cattle outfit, under a 65 per cent calf crop and 5 per cent death loss, is 25 per cent. To sell 100 head of cattle a year an outfit must carry 400 cattle of all ages. These 100 cattle sold must pay the bill for all.

A large calf crop is the most vital factor in the cost of cattle production. If the calf crop is larger than the average of 65 per cent the cost of a weaned calf is proportionately less.

Under range conditions it is often difficult to raise a large percentage. Cowmen have their own ideas as to what system of management would accomplish an increase. All are agreed on the fact that it requires control of the bulls during the breeding season. It is pretty generally true that breeding in pastures assures a higher percentage of calves.
