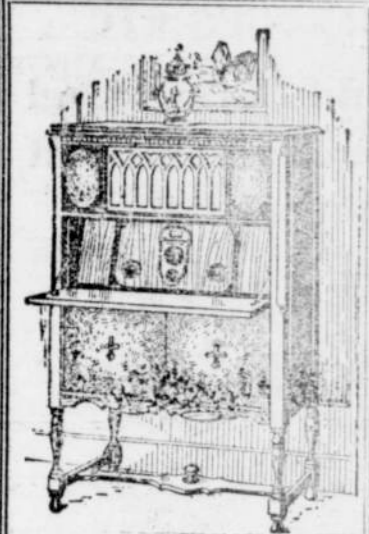

New York.—Having made \$175,000 in three years selling real estate, Henry O'Reilly of New York city has begun an unusual journey with his wife and baby son, Donald. He has sailed for his old home in St. Johns, Newfoundland, to shake the hand of the man who kicked him into the lap of fortune. Fourteen years ago, when O'Reilly was an honor student at St. Bonaventure's college at St. Johns, his Irish blood rebelled at hazing, and he sliced his razor across the face with a carving knife. For that he received such a beating that he could not leave his bed for two weeks. That beating, administered by one of the students at the college, proved the beginning of the turn of fortune for O'Reilly. He left the college, went to sea, fought through the war in the English navy, and then came to this country. He married. Yet three years ago the O'Reillys still were "broke." Then came their tremendous prosperity with the boom of Long Island real estate, which O'Reilly was selling. "I might have kept on being just as poor as my father if that brother at college hadn't given me the worst beating of my life," O'Reilly said. "Hold it against him? No, I am going back to shake the hand of the man who kicked me into the lap of fortune."

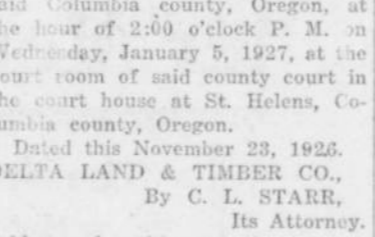
