Leforest B. Stewart, Nehalem valley pioneer, died here January 6, after having suffered a stroke of paralysis three days before. He was born 68 years ago in California, and has been a resident of Vernonia for 35 years, having homesteaded here.

For many years Mr. Stewart was a druggist here, selling out about four years ago to Wm. Folger. Previous to that he had practiced medicine to some extent, being the son of a physician. He was married twice, the first wife living but a few years after their marriage. He was married to Bird B. Clark about four years ago. Mr. Stewart owned considerable property in the city and outside of Vernonia. He was a member of the United Artisans lodge. The funeral was held in Portland and he was laid to rest in Mt. Scott cemetery. Near relatives of the deceased are: His widow, Mrs. L. B. Stewart; a sister, Mrs. Mamie A. Lane; a niece, Mrs. Jack Harmon; and a nephew Charter Kaupp.

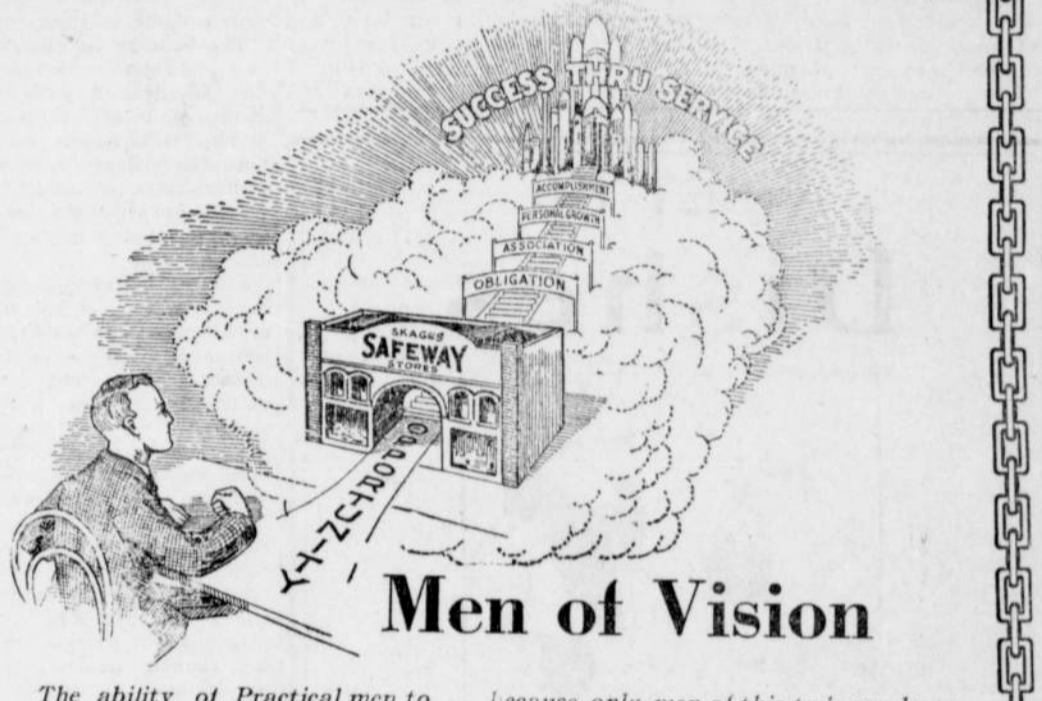
Police Report.
