## O. A. C. Cannery School Will Start February 7

Northwest cannery will meet in the sixth annual cannery school at O. A. C., Corvallis, February 7, to get information in the phases of the canning industry most desired by them. Latest developments in canning and allied subjects will be stressed throughout, says E. H. Wiegand, professor of horticultural product.

"It is the policy of the department to change the courses from year to year to keep pace with the progress of the industry," said professor Wiegand. Cannery students wanting special work all have opportunity to carry out three weeks of intensive study in their chosen line.

The building in which the course is carried was especially designed for investigation work and application of theory to practice. The factory is equipped with sirupers, hotwater exhaust box, and rotary cooker, retorts, coolers, pfaulder vacuum pan, double-jacketed kettles and capping machines for glass and for tin.

Students registering in the school may take any or all the courses, or if they can attend but part time may select the part they wish. Those arriving late will be permitted to register and join the classes.

Forenoons of the second and third weeks will be given over to lectures and discussions, with a demonstration of cutting the products for the day. Afternoons will care for studies of varieties, cultural methods, fungus diseases and insects, and harvesting and storage. Evenings will provide lantern slides and canning movies, supplemented by lectures on timely topics by specialists in the various fields of canning. The following courses have been listed double seaming course, preparation and canning of fruits and vegetables, jelly and jam manufacture, pickles and sauerkraut, bacteriology of canned foods cannery waste, cannery steam plant cannery organization and management, handling and storing of fruits, growing and handling vegetables for canning, recent developments of ettensburg strawberry, law pertaining to the canning industry, spraying for quality and quantity, installation and care of machinery, economic basis of marketing, functional middleman, wood containers.
