Would Change Present Educational System

University of Oregon, Eugene, Oregon, Feb. 14.—Complete reorganization of the present university educational system, looking towards separation of students on the basis of interests and abilities

and the granting of a greater amount of academic freedom to these showing interest in genuine higher education, is proposed in the concluding section of a report on the intellectual life of the University of Oregon, made by an independent undergraduate committee.

Members of the student committee are Sol Abramson, editor of the Daily Emerald, Henry Alderman, Kenneth Bombricht, Bertram Jessup, Ray Nash, David Turteltaub, all of Portland; Glenn Burch of Gladstone; Thomas Graham of Oak Grove.

In previously published statements the committee divided the registrants into three groups, pupils, students and graduates. The pupils were defined as those persons who come to college for the "college man" label. The students, the majority of registrants, are those who seriously pursue themselves in the study of professional and other material. The graduates are described as those who give themselves to learning for its own sake.

The thesis of the committee has been that while the university has been called generally for its pupils and students, its students have been entirely neglected. Such a program would be carried out of keeping with the true purpose of higher educational institutions. Such a program would be of ridding the university of the pupil and of granting the student opportunity to do genuine work, unhampered by those whose interests do not encompass higher learning, the committee has suggested the establishment of a junior college and an honors college within the university.

The second two years would be made strictly upper division, open only to those persons who had at least by average quality during the first two years qualified for higher education. The registrants permitted to continue would be permitted into two classes, pass and honor students. The pass students would continue as under the existing plan. The honor students would be cared for in the proposed honor college.

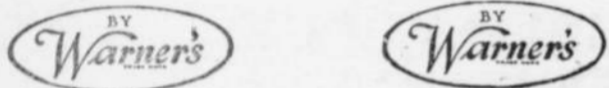
The Majestic
