which 29,000 occurred in the last year. Dairy cattle over two years old decreased by 11,000 between 1925 and 1926, but continued at 214,000 head in 1926 and 1927. Dairy heifers have stood at 44,000 head throughout the period. There has been a gradual increase in the number of sheep, there being 2,226,000 head now as compared to 2,039,000 in 1925. Swine have also increased. The estimates show 245,000 head compared to 223,000 head a year ago and the same number a year earlier.
