No. Order to show cause why order for sale of real estate should not be made.

It appearing to the Court from the petition heretofore presented and filed by D. A. Dobbs, Guardian of the estate and persons of the above named minors, praying for an order of sale of the real estate therein described, and it is necessary, expedient and beneficial to the wards that all of such real estate be sold;

It further appearing that D. A. Dobbs of Vernonia, Oregon, is the father of said wards, and Jane Doe

Dobbs, address unknown, over the age of twenty one years, is a sister of said wards, and are the next of kin of said wards;

IT IS THEREFORE ORDERED that the said D. A. Dobbs, father, and the said Jane Doe Dobbs, sister, of the said wards, and that all persons interested in said estate appear before this Court on Tuesday, the 12th day of April, 1927, at 9:00 A. **Home Pointers**

(From School of Home Economics) The standard portion for soft custard is 4 eggs to 4 cups of milk. Six eggs to 4 cups of milk are used for baked custard to be turned out of the mold. Being beaten with a Dover egg beater until smooth, curdled custard is corrected. Lumps will be prevented if the cornstarch is blended with the sugar or some of the liquid before it is added to the scalding milk.

When care is used in preparing cheese dishes so as not to cook the cheese too much, it will not be stringy and curdled.

Quantities to buy for serving six people vegetables are 6 pounds of unshelled green peas, 2 pounds of carrots, 2 pounds of string beans, and 1 pound of rice.

Colorful garnishes are nasturtium or grape leaves on salad or vegetable dishes.

Lettuce is attractively shredded by rolling the leaves and cutting with scissors.

Celery is curled by cutting tender stalks into 3 inch pieces, slashing the ends into thin strips 1 inch long and letting stand in ice water for two or three hours.

One cup of butter equals one-half pound. Forty-eight to fifty-six cups of coffee can be made from 1 pound. One cup of walnut meats equals one-fourth of a pound. One cup of granulated sugar equals one-half pound.

**Farm Reminders**

Oregon bee keepers are checking up now on the amount of stores in colonies says H. A. Scullen bee specialist of the experiment station. The cold wet spring results in shortage of stores. A good grade of sugar syrup, 2 1/2 parts of sugar to 1 part of water, is fed at this time if the honey supply is low.

The cold wet spring is causing Oregon growers to plan an especially thorough spraying program to combat fruit diseases, says H. P. Bars, plant pathologist of the experiment station. This is a serious year for apple and pear scab, brown rot of stone fruits, anthracnose of currants and gooseberries and leaf spot of cane fruits.

The annual meeting of the American Honey Producers league will be held in San Francisco next year, according to a decision just reached by officials of the league. For the first time in the history of the league the meeting will be held in the west.

H. F. Wilson, professor of en-

tomology at the university of Wisconsin, and formerly head of the department of entomology at Oregon agricultural college, has just been president of the league.

Rich, heavy foods should be served with lighter, more succulent foods. This evens up the calories and avoids too heavy tax on the digestive system. For example, a light lettuce salad is relished with a heavy meat dish.

Contrast in flavor is important in a meal. Don't repeat the same flavor too often. For instance, even though we liked tomatoes, we would not relish a meal commencing with tomato soup, followed by tomato sauce on the meat, or stewed tomatoes, and fresh sliced tomato salad.

Heifers get their inheritance for producing ability from their sire and their dam.

Pasteurization doesn't destroy food value in milk. A temperature of 145 degrees Fahrenheit for 30 minutes hasn't marked effect on the chemical make-up of milk, or its growth-promoting properties. Some scientists say that pasteurization makes the vitamin which prevents scurvy, less effective. But this same vitamin is also found in fruits and vegetables, so it probably doesn't matter so much. Pasteurization kills disease-producing bacteria in milk.

You can continue a strawberry patch more than two years if you will keep it clean, well cultivated and fertilized, and take out the old plants and save strong young plants each year. It is usually preferable to set new plants each spring and take out the two-year old plants after they have fruited.

The chief advantage resulting from the green sprouting of seed potatoes in the light, is that of indicating the strongest eyes. In cutting such tubers it is possible to discard the weak and blind or dead eyes, thereby, insuring a practically perfect stand of plants of uniform vigor. When grown for an early crop the plants from sprouting seed are usually ready to dig a few days earlier than those from unsprouted seed and the yield is usually greater.

You can't expect tonics, which the hens take internally, to kill coccidies, mites, blue bugs, fleas, and those sorts of parasites. Don't waste your money that way. You won't kill the bugs—but you may kill the chickens.

Don't sprinkle the dropping boards with hydrated lime. You'll lose a lot of the ammonia that way. A better practice is to mix acid phosphate with the droppings when they are stored.

**"Inside" Information**

Don't iron white silk with a very hot iron. All silk scorches

easily, and too great heat turns white silk yellow. Use a warm iron on the wrong side of the silk, and protect it with cheesecloth.

Foods which stimulate the appetite and promote digestion should be served at the beginning of the meal. That's the reason many people like to start a dinner with a light well-flavored soup. Fruit "appetizers" are also good.

When choosing children's garments, consider the durability of the material, whether or not it will launder well and easily, and what provision is made for the growth of the child. Can the child put it on and take it off himself. These points are just as important as attractive design or color.

To clean upholstered furniture, either a vacuum cleaner or a brush may be used. A soft brush is best for velvet and velour, a stiffer brush for tapestry, and other strong firm materials. When convenient, take upholstered furniture out of doors occasionally and beat with a flat carpet beater.

Have corn fritters once in a while. They go especially well with an all vegetable meal in such combinations as spinach, creamed onions and stewed tomatoes; or string beans, carrots, and lettuce salad;

or quick-cooked cabbage, beets, and buttered mashed rutabagas. The corn fritters add richness and crispness to any of these vegetable combinations. The United States department of agriculture will tell you how to make them.
