

CLATSKANIE CHIEF

The Clatskanie Business Men's club appointed a committee at its Wednesday meeting to interview Assessor W. S. Roberts concerning the "blue blank" confidential reports.

Arthur Bowman, Portland bulb authority, who has inspected virtually all the Pacific coast narcissus bulb plantings this spring, addressed members of the Daffodil association of Washington county at the Chamber of Commerce rooms on Tuesday evening. Mr. Bowman talked in an interesting way about growing and marketing and told of heavy losses suffered by California and southern states growers. Nowhere, he said, had he seen better blossoms than he found Forest Grove.

Fire of undetermined origin on Wednesday afternoon totally destroyed the home of P. J. Clark home, on the Thatcher road, about one-half mile from Forest Grove.

Preparations for the special city election held on April 20 and consideration of the purchase of steam turbine equipment for the city light plant occupied the attention of the city council at its April meeting.

Funeral services for John Nathan Hoffman, justice of the peace, former mayor and active business man, were held on Monday afternoon and scores of the friends he had been surrounded by since he came to Forest Grove were among the mourners.

Train No. 132 will leave Portland 5:15 p. m., as at present, arrive Forest Grove 6:30 p. m., five minutes earlier than at present.

Forest Grove high was defeated by Banks in a baseball game Tuesday with a score of 10-1. The entire Forest Grove team, composed John W. Grimshaw, 68, well known farmer of the Beaver Homes section died Saturday at his home near Goble. He was one of the progressive farmers of the county.

Wednesday, April 13th is the date of the big spring community sale to be held at the fair grounds near Deer Island. This is the fourth of a series of these sales and each one is proving more successful than the preceding one.

With the granting of the permit by the city council to G. E. LaSalle to construct the new K. of P. building the total permits granted by the council since the first of this year amount to -64,031. Such were the figures announced to the council by Recorder Beeler. There are just 25 permits issued this year which have an average value of \$2560.

Late planting of spring grain is not a good Oregon practice. Grain planted after the first of May gives small yields according to results at the experiment station. It is important that wheat, oats and barley be planted as soon as the seed bed can be prepared in the spring.

Early planting is necessary for field peas in Oregon. This crop needs cool, moist conditions to insure good growth the experiment station has found. Late plant peas are susceptible to aphid injury.

Late sown grain for hay is better without peas.
