DRY WEATHER KNOCKS

SOCKS OFF WEEDS

The Cactus Flat Chamber of Commerce held another meeting this week to discuss the most practical method of ridding Main Street of weeds, which are an eyesore to tourists and other adventurers who have to come through Cactus Flat on their way to the fishing grounds in the High Sierras.

Insect damage to forest trees can be reduced by cutting at the proper time of year and by utilizing lightning-killed trees without delay.

Calcium and phosphorous, two elements likely to be lacking in the average dairy ration, are important bone, builders, says the United States department of agriculture. Feeds that furnish a considerable amount of calcium are properly cured legume hays. Cowpea hay ranks first in calcium content, but alfalfa, soybean, and red clover hays are close seconds. Any of these hays, if well cured and fed in liberal quantities will furnish the calcium needed by dairy cows. Phosphorous can be supplied by feeding considerable amounts of wheat bran, cotton-seed meal, soybean meal, or linseedoil meal in the grain ration.

That closer spacing of cotton plants in the row tends to increase yields and reduce weevil damage has been demonstrated by five summers of experimental work at the Cotton-Breeding Field Station at Greenville, Tex., by the United States department of agriculture. In some seasons the highest yields were obtained from rows not thinned or chopped but left with plants averaging 2 to 4 inches apart. Closely spaced plants produce few vegetative branches, so that the lanes between the rows are left open and the ground exposed to direct sunlight during the summer. The heat of the sun in the open row lanes rapidly dries out the squares containing the boll-weevil larvae and materially reduces their number.

The most thorough method of eradicating avian tuberculosis (tuberculosis of fowls) is to slaughter the entire flock when indications point to an extensive outbreak. Fowls in good flesh, showing no lesions or slight ones, may be used for food. Badly diseased birds and all visceral organs should be destroyed. The chicken houses, enclosed runs, and all eating, drinking, and other utensils should be thoroughly cleaned and disinfected with a strong solution of such germicides as carbolic acid, cresol, or any of the recognized coal-tar preparations or dips. Carbolic acid may be used in 5 per cent solution, compound cresol in 3 per cent solution, and formaldehyde in the proportion of 1 part of commercial formalin to 10 parts of water. Ordinary quicklime is a good, cheap disinfectant for poultry yards. Tabulations of cow-testing-asso-

ciation records made by the U. S. department of agriculture show that selection of the bulls perhaps the most important factor to be considered in the development of a high-producing, economical dairy herd. At the present time 216 purebred sires have been proved by comparing the records of five or more daughters with the records of the dams of the daughters. A large number of purebred sires have been partially proved by comparing the records of one or more daughters with the records of the dams of the daughters. Data from these records so far tabulated show that about one-third of the purebred sires are lowering the production of their daughters in comparison with the production of the dams of those daughters; about one-third are raising the production slightly; whereas the great increases are coming from only about one-third. The higher the production of the herd the more difficult it is to raise production through the sire and the greater the need for using a bull of proved ability.
