THE COUNTRY DOCTOR

The scarcity of the country doctor as a source of keen popular interest is matching the scarcity of teachers in the rural districts which has been met by consolidations and the employment of specially trained "teachers' helpers." The country doctor is stronger in tradition than the country teacher and his disappearance even by rumor is disturbing. In the generation represented by the grandparents of today the country doctor was one of the greatest American institutions. He carried his supply of crude drugs in his saddle bags and an exhaustless sunshine in his face and his cheery words. Whatever he may have lacked of scientific attainment to handicap him as compared to his own brother, he compensated for in that rare atmosphere of fraternal cheerfulness which no country doctor was without.

Patients improved when they heard his horse's hoofs on the road. All the people for miles around were as members of one big family so far as the doctor was concerned. As the towns grew the young doctors chose to display their skill there, some because the life was less laborious, some because they believed rewards better. The country doctor of today is at the disappearing point, largely because of his consideration for wife and children. He says frankly cash returns are satisfactory often, but that he wants better conditions for wife and family than he finds in the country.

FAMILY REUNIONS

Family ties are said not to be as close as they used to be, and yet many families are having reunions where a large number of near and distant relatives are gathered together. Interest in genealogical research is said to be increasing, and many people are anxious to find out who their ancestors were and where they came from, and the desire to know the members of one's old family tribe will never disappear.

An obstacle in the way of such associations is created by the scattering of families all over the country. Where a family used to settle down in its home town or near by the present generation is likely to scatter all over the land, and some may go to foreign nations. Yet as people travel more easily than formerly many may come from distant points when the tribe holds its powwow.

It may be said that the tie that holds these distant relatives together is not close, since the people who assemble in an annual family gathering may never meet elsewhere, and yet not feel any particular congeniality of temperament. And yet anything rooted so deeply in old traditions as the ties of family relationship, must still be much of a power.

Back in old history people looked to their families for protection. Tribe fought against tribe, and if you were attacked and your safety assailed, your government might not be able to do anything for you, but your kinsmen would rally and beat off the tribe that menaced you.

* Those old times of tribal warfare are happily gone forever. But the members of a family tribe now can reflect that they no doubt share certain traits handed down from common ancestors. Hence they should have ideas in common, and when they get together they should have important elements of congeniality that run deep in their natures.

FARM REMINDERS

Oregon farmers are not behind brethren in other parts of the United States in the use of electricity on their farms and in their farm homes, reports the experiment station. In Oregon horticulture, electricity has been used in dehydration of prunes and nuts. The design of dehydrators has been vastly improved in the last few years and the capacity approximately doubled by the recirculation system.

Irrigation of prunes in Douglas county conducted by Huron Clough of Canyonville obtained on 20 acres an increase estimated at \$1000 in two seasons and \$500 in a third. The prunes were larger in size and brought a higher price. A number of prune growers in the

same district are reported as having succeeded with irrigation.

"Clover mildew has come to Oregon to stay," says H. P. Barass plant pathologist of the Oregon experiment station. "Infections in southern and eastern Oregon, especially in the irrigated sections have caused many inquiries for the clover treatment. Applications of dusting sulphur will kill the mildew. In most cases this is not necessary until after the first mowing."
