### Football Team Loses Stiff Contest at Castle Rock, Wash.

The Vernonia football team came out on the short end of a 19 to 7 score in a hard fought contest at Castle Rock, Wash., Saturday. The first half of the game Vernonia was on the offensive and scored their touchdown.

The third period Castle Rock broke through the Vernonia line for a touchdown, failing to convert. Shortly afterward they intercepted a pass and ran for another touchdown, giving them a total of 13 points to Vernonia 7. A third touchdown was made in the same quarter by an end run.

The fourth period Vernonia rallied and fought the most of the length of the field, only to lose the ball on downs. Shortly afterwards the ball was regained on downs and pushed to Castle Rock's 3-yard line, when the final whistle ended the game.

The Vernonia line did excellent work in this game in the opinion of those who viewed the contest. Very little yardage was made by their opponents through the line.

The party crossed the river at Rainier and passed through Longview, Dale McDaniel driving the truck, and Miss Malmsten acted as chaperone. Phoebe Greenman led the Vernonia rooting section.
