Vernonia Is Defeated By Rainier Saturday

The Vernonia high school football team suffered defeat Saturday at the hands of the Rainier team at Rainier, 26 to 6.

Rainier scored one touchdown the first quarter on a pass to their right end. The second quarter Rainier ran the ball over Vernonia's goal line for the second touchdown, making the score 13 to 0 in their favor at the end of the first half.

The third quarter Rainier kicked off to Vernonia and the visitors made end runs and line bucks for a touchdown. Vernonia again ran the ball within scoring distance, but lost the ball on downs and Rainier punted to safety.

The fourth quarter found both teams fighting hard. In the last five minutes of play Rainier made a line plunge off tackle for another touchdown. This seemed to take the fight out of Vernonia, and another was slipped over before the final whistle.

This is the first touchdown that Vernonia has ever made against a Rainier team, Vernonia winning the game last year 3 to 0.
