#### Final Assembly Line

#### Ready To Begin Work

#### At Large Fordson Plant

The final assembly line, for

years the chief attraction for visitors at the Highland Park plant,

has been transferred to the Fordson plant and is now practically

ready to begin assembly operations.

The line formerly occupied a space approximately 680 feet long at the W building, Highland Park.

In its new home in the B building, Fordson, this space has been cut in half.

Despite the reduced length of the line its assembly capacity

will remain the same at at High-

land Park.

Locating the line at the Fordson plant eliminates the necessity for shipping motors and chassis and body parts to the Highland Park plant by rail, plus the extra handling of these materials which that method involved. Under the present new arrangement all the heavier assemblies and parts will be sent by conveyor from the place of their manufacture to the proper point on the new line.

This means that the loading, unloading, switching, and hauling of 2500 cars of freight yearly will be saved.

Clover straw and clover cut for

seed that has been spoiled by early rains make excellent fertilizers, says the experiment station.

Prepare citrus fruits for salad the night before and let drain over night—when the dressing is added the salad will not be watery.

Put a small piece of lemon rind in the aluminum pan when you are cooking eggs in the shell—then the water will not stain the pan.


