"Inside" Information

Veal cutlets should be served well done, not rare like mature beef.

Biscuits can be cooked at the table on a small electric stove. Use two pans to keep the family supplied. Put the biscuits in a pan, cover it, and place it on top of the stove. The biscuits will rise, and brown on the bottom. Then slip the pan underneath the red hot wires of the stove. The biscuits will be a delicate brown. By keeping two pans going you can cook a sufficient number and serve piping hot biscuits.

Take a hint from Mother Nature in planning color effects in your clothing. Bright colors in small areas are used with dull colors such as are most easily worn by the average person, to give interest and accent. Greys, greens, browns, tans, and soft blues are used for backgrounds frequently, while a touch of red, orange, vivid blue or purple may be sufficient

to brighten up the whole effect. To tell whether a color is becoming to you, select material of different colors and drape them over your shoulders so you can study the effect.

Green tomato pie can be made from some of the last unripened tomatoes. For one pie, take 4 or 5 medium sized green tomatoes, slice, and heat with 1/2 lemon in thin slices, 3/4 cup of sugar, 1/2 teaspoon salt, and 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon until the tomatoes are tender. Add 1 1/2 tablespoons cornstarch, and cook until the cornstarch does not taste raw. Take from the fire, add 1 tablespoon of butter and pour into a prebaked pie crust. Cover with an upper crust, and bake about 12 minutes in a hot oven until the upper crust is done. If there is not enough liquid in the tomatoes to cook them, add a little water when stewing them. Be careful to prebake the lower crust only until it is delicately browned.

Starch clothes wrong side out. Leave the wrong side out until they are sprinkled. For white clothes use starch as hot as you can stand it. Hot starch goes through the fabric better and more evenly, and does not leave shiny spots when ironed. Keep most of the starch hot. Use only part of it at a time. Replace it when it gets cold and thin. The ideal way is to have two pans of starch, beside the reserve supply. Dilute one with enough water to make a good paste for the thinner materials, and keep the other thick enough for the heavier clothes. Begin by starching the clothes you want stiffest. Clothes wrung very dry before starching will be stiffer than wetter ones. White starch shows plainly when used on dark colored clothes. It may be tinted with tea or coffee for browns, and with bluing for blues, or especially tinted products may be purchased.

FARM MARKET REVIEW

Turkeys. Although weather conditions last spring were unfavorable for turkey production and caused late hatching and losses which reduced the prospective crop for the United States to about 95 per cent of last year, conditions this fall have been so favorable that it is now expected that the birds will be better developed by Thanksgiving than in 1926 or 1925.

Eggs. Egg markets continued firm in October. Prices on higher grades advanced 8-10 cents which is more than usual and placed the better grades above last year. Medium and lower grades did not advance proportionately and are scarcely as high as in 1926, with storage eggs selling consistently below a year ago. Receipts during the past three months were below 1926 and equally poorer. The excess storage holdings have been disposed of, but the new crop of pullets is now getting into production which with the tendency to increase winter production may discount the firm elements in the situation.

Butter. Pacific coast butter markets were about steady but steadiness continued in eastern quarters.

Grain. There was not a sharp change in futures but cash prices generally were steady higher last week. Heavy movement of Canadian wheat was offset by firmness at Liverpool. Premium for protein were higher but soft red winter premiums were lower at St. Louis with mills inclined to use substitute wheats. Export movement on the Pacific coast was slowing up and prices were depressed somewhat because of wet wheat on the markets. Competition with eastern barley caused Pacific coast barley markets to weaken, but eastern markets held steady. In Oregon wet wheat is being used in substitute for barley. Corn, oats and flax prices were not much changed.

Livestock. Good fat cattle were steady but poorly finished stuff registered declines in eastern quarters. Feeders and stockers were in good demand. Curtailed shipments following sharp declines the previous week caused hog markets to advance somewhat. Although fat lambs supplies were far short of previous marks, prices did not advance. Feeders were scarcely steady.

Wool. The wool markets maintained the same steady, strong tone which has prevailed for several weeks.

Farm Reminders

To check the swarms of insects that seem at times almost able to swamp the vegetable garden, fall garden sanitation is a big help. These pests that persist from year to year must find some place to winter over, and many of them lodge in and about the gardens in some form, adult, larva, pupa, or eggs, says the experiment station. Hosts of them may be destroyed in Oregon by plowing the gardens in the fall and leaving the surface clear except for the late fall and early winter stuff. Then in the spring the ground is lightly cultivated and spread with poison bran mash to get the early starters before the crops are up.

Honey in addition to having more sweetening power than granulated sugar contains the much needed minerals that are removed entirely when sugar is refined, says H. A. Scullen, Oregon state bee specialist. Corn syrup or molasses are inferior to honey. The former is lacking both in sweetening power and minerals, and the latter contains an excess of lime. Honey is the only commercial sweet now known to contain vitamins.

Growers in Oregon who do not have sufficient hay and are anxious to grow an additional acreage next spring may use oats and Canadian field peas. This combination crop gives a good quality hay and has given a satisfactory yield at the experiment station when sown real early in the spring.

Some fields of Landino clover, the giant form of white clover which has given such excellent yields under irrigated conditions, have been certified by the Oregon agricultural college. These fields are free from noxious weeds and alsike clover. Sources of this seed may be obtained on application to the college.

If the drainboard or the meat board becomes discolored there is nothing better than lemon juice to restore whiteness. After squeezing the juice out of lemons for cooking purposes save the rinds to rub over the drainboard or meat board.

You may have a favorite commercial cleaner for the sink and drainpipe but if you ever run out try a hot solution of regular old-fashioned washing soda.

Refrigerators and coolers are kept sweet and clean by a weekly washing with washing soda solution. Use a level tablespoon to two quarts of hot water and rinse with clear water.

To remove iron rust from anything first sprinkle a generous amount of salt on the rust stain then squeeze pure lemon juice generously over it and allow to stand for several hours. If one application is not entirely effective, try again. The salt and lemon juice mixture is harmless even to your finest lunch cloth.
