

Sour kraut is made by slicing the head of cabbage into thin strips and packing it into earthen crocks or wooden containers. Alternate layers of cut cabbage and salt are packed in firmly using one ounce of salt to two and one-half pounds of cabbage will develop its own brine, according to the department of horticultural products at the state college. When the container is filled it is covered with muslin cloth

and a wood lid weighted with a jug of water or some other material that will not be affected by the brine.
